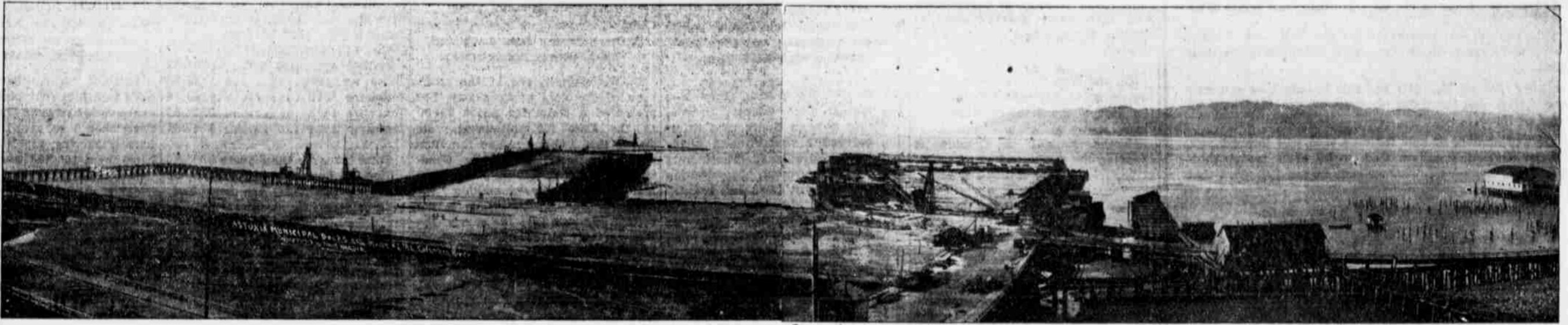

### COURT IN CURRY

August Term Will Be Longer Than Usual

Judge Coke will preside in some cases for Judge Skipworth in exchange for the latter's services in Coos and Curry.

### S. H. HEDGES OF SEATTLE CONFERS WITH MANAGER MILLER

Suction Dredge Will Remain on Coos Bay Pending New Contracts—Outlook Better

S. H. Hedges of the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredge company arrived here last evening from Seattle to confer with R. E. Miller, his local manager, concerning work here and the dredge Seattle which is now at Bandon where it recently completed a \$50,000 contract. Mr. Hedges said today that he expected that the Seattle would be brought to Coos Bay and tied up pending the securing of new contracts for her. There are a number of matters pending and just how soon the new work may be secured is uncertain.

Mr. Hedges was much pleased with the work of Manager R. E. Miller on Coos Bay and on the Coquille. He said that Mr. Miller would remain on the Bay for the time being but before long would probably be promoted to a position in the home offices of the company in Seattle.

### Business Outlook Better.

"The business outlook is good," said Mr. Hedges. "There is an uncertainty prevailing owing to the European war that has been holding back development but this will soon pass away. When times do pick up, I look for the Pacific coast and Alaska to enjoy the greatest era of prosperity the world has ever known. We have a great country on the Pacific coast and its development has hardly begun. If in the discovery of America, the Pacific coast had been discovered first and the development of the United States had been from the west, the Indians would still be roaming around the eastern coast, where Boston and the other cities are located. "We had a great time in Seattle entertaining the Shriners. We spent \$100,000 in entertaining them. We certainly opened the eyes of the easterners."

Mr. Hedges expects to leave today via Coquille and Roseburg for home. He was at San Francisco with the Shriners following the big session in Seattle.

### FUNERAL TODAY

Burial of W. H. Thomas Is Held at Coquille

COQUILLE, Ore., July 31.—The funeral of W. H. Thomas was held this afternoon from the Ellingsen-undertaking rooms in Coquille. The services were conducted by Rev. J. E. Walbeck and the burial was at the Odd Fellows Cemetery. The Odd Fellows were in charge.

Mr. Thomas died Thursday. He was one of the old residents of this section and was past 73 years of age. Mr. Thomas was born at Stephens, Nova Scotia but has been a resident of Coos county for about 25 years. He leaves three children, two daughters and a son by his first marriage, but none by his last wife who survives him.
