OPIMUM RUMOR JOKE

REPORT FOUR CANS WERE FOUND ON NORTHWEST

Originated From New Excuse for Port Not Removing Old Bulk From Inlet

A report was circulated around town today that four cans of opium had been found secreted in the old Northwest, the schooner which was raised from the bottom of Isthmus Inlet near the Courtney mill a couple of days ago.

It originated as a joke—a new excuse for the Port of Coos Bay not removing the vessel from the channel where it is obstructing the operations of the Houck and Samuels mill. Chas. Colding said that owing to a report of opium being found aboard the craft, she could not be moved until the U. S. Inspectors came in and thoroughly examined the old ship and found out who had been smuggling. Some one took him seriously and hence the report.

The Port of Coos Bay will not hold a regular meeting until August 9 and whether anything will be done with the old bulk, which has been pumped out at a cost of about \$425 and is now afloat, until then is not certain.
