EXAMINING ROADS

GOVERNMENT ENGINEER MAKES VISIT TO CURRY COUNTY

Believed that Aid May Be Given Locally for Building of Good Roads

There appears to be a chance of Curry county receiving government aid for road building. The Gold Beach Globe gives the following statement.

James B. Schuyler, a U. S. Engineer from the office of Public Highways, was sent here by the Forestry Department to look over Curry County and particularly the proposed Rogue river Highway. Mr. Schuyler has made close inspection of Curry's roads as to roads and highways. He came up the coast from Harbor and in company with County Engineer Caughell went to the northern county line, and left for a trip of inspection up the river.

Mr. Schuyler's particular business was to try to determine which would be the greatest benefit to the greatest number of people, a coast road through the county or a road from the interior down Rogue river to the ocean. From Mr. Schuyler's conversation on the subject it is believed he favors a coast road.

However he says that little of the present road could be utilized and he places a rough estimate of its cost at about seven hundred thousand dollars. Mr. Schuyler expressed himself as deeply interested in Curry County, and, like many Forestry officials, says that Curry will be among the first to receive government attention and that it is nearer at hand than most people are aware of.

He was greatly impressed with the scenic beauty of Curry county and says that the Columbia Highway would not be in it for scenic beauty and rugged grandeur compared to one down the coast.

NANN SMITH TO TAKE CARGO FROM CHILE TO SEATTLE

Capt. Will Magee and Crew to Go With Vessel—Probably Carry Nitrates for the Allies

Capt. B. W. Olson of the Adeline Smith, who arrived in late Saturday night from San Francisco stated that he understood that the Nann Smith had been chartered by the W. R. Grace Co., the big international shipping firm, for a period of seventy five days. She is to take a cargo to Chile where it is understood that she will take on a cargo of nitrates for Seattle.

Capt. W. A. Magee and the regular crew will probably make the charter voyages with her.

It is understood that the nitrates are for shipment to Japan or Russia as immense quantities of war munitions are being shipped from there to Asia now.

The closing of the logging camp at this time by the Booth-Kelly company is due largely to the depression in the lumber market. There is not demand enough to keep all their mills going.
