

COOS REPORT IN

DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSION SENDS ITS FINDINGS

Scoring is Based on the Recent Inspection Held in the Various Cities

A report of the inspections made in Coos County by the dairy and food commission has been received. The commission states that as the county had but very few such inspection some of the low scores were not unexpected. A score card was issued which rates the places according to fitness in construction and in cleanliness.

The commission states that the members were pleased with the way proprietors were willing to make changes to better their conditions. A number of bad slaughter houses were found and some meat shops were in bad shape. These things were ordered corrected.

Milk sold on the street was found to be much higher in standard than some sold to the creameries. A detailed report on this will follow, to come later.
