SEVERE CODE NOW PREVAILS

Soldiers and Texas Peace Officers Deal in Summary Manner With Mexicans

TRAINS HELD READY

Can be Used by Troops and Officials for Quick Runs Answering Alarms

NEEDS NO MORE SOLDIERS

General Funston Has Conference With Governor of Texas and Reports to Washington—Seems to Have Situation Well in Hand

FUNSTON ASK FOR TROOPS LATE TODAY

(Special to The Times) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—Late today the war department at the request of General Funston ordered one regiment of infantry from Texas City to Brownsville and also one aeroplane, one battery of 4.7 guns and one battery of 4.7 howitzers to Brownsville from Fort Still, Okla.

CARRANZA MEN
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BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Aug. 14.—Carranza soldiers, it was learned today, temporarily took possession of Islate, No. 10 in the Rio Grande for a short time while the Mexican raiding at its height a few days ago. Peace officers and rangers have adopted a summary code in handling suspected Mexicans. At Fort Brown here, the following report was turned in, made by peace officers to the army patrol officer:

"We met two Mexicans. They tried to escape. We could not identify them, so we left them there. Mexicans were buried."

Martial Law On.
The entire lower Rio Grande Valley has the appearance of martial law but it is a silent law. The population is so comparatively sparse that strangers are recognized and checked up immediately, usually with out being asked any questions. Mexicans Seva.

Mexicans everywhere are visible, working in the fields or mixing with the soldiers and rangers at the stations. Train crews are italy to uncouple engines any time and turn them over to the soldiers or peace officers for runs to any alarms.

CROSS THE BORDER

Band of Mexicans Awaited by Cavalry and Citizens

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) LAREDO, TEXAS, Aug. 14.—A party of 80 Mexicans under a leader named Cabrera has appeared between Zapata and Rio Grande City on the Texas side. A detachment of the fourteenth cavalry at Zapata, with the aid of citizens, is prepared to resist the bandits if they reach that point.

TIRED OF FIGHTING

SEVERAL MEXICAN STATES SAY REVOLUTION OVER

Refuse to Recognize Villa or Carranza and Will Resist Invasion of Territory

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 14.—The military commanders of the states of Sinna, Tepic, Chilapas, Oaxaca, Guerrero, and, it is believed, Durango, have refused to recognize the authority of either Villa or Carranza, according to authoritative advices here today. It is said the commanders decided that for those states the revolution is over, although they were prepared to resist the invasion of their states, the soldiers to be used in planting and harvesting.

TO ASK FOR BATTERY

General Funston Will Recommend to War Department

PLENTY OF TROOPS

Gen Funston Says He Can Handle the Situation

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—General Funston reported to the war department today that after a conference with Governor Ferguson of Texas it was agreed that no more troops were needed at this time. Gen. Funston added that most of the raiders who crossed the line near Brownsville were Mexicans and they were joined by about 25 Mexican residents of Texas.

CLEAR LOGGED LAND

EXPERTS OF U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE COMING

Will Deliver Lectures on Utilization of Property and Also Demonstrate Best Methods

Two experts of the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be on Coos Bay next week to lecture on the utilizing of logged off lands and also to give demonstrations of the best methods of clearing these tracts. They are Messrs. Brodie and Strait. J. L. Smith, Coos county agriculturist, writes from Portland that they will be in Marshfield Wednesday when a meeting will be held at the Chamber of Commerce.

Messrs. Brodie and Strait are experts in this line and it is one of the most important problems in Coos county's future. Besides speaking at the meeting to be held at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce Wednesday morning, during which they will touch on the improvement and utilization of the logged off tracts, they will give practical demonstrations of stump pulling, blasting, charr-planting, etc.

Mr. Smith is expected here today to arrange for the tour of his section.

MANLEY SUSTAINED

MAYOR DISMISSED

CARRANZA REMOVES HEAD EXECUTIVE OF VERA CRUZ

Action on Account of Permitting Anti-Foreign Demonstration Which Caused Recent Alarm

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—Carranza has summarily dismissed the mayor of Vera Cruz from office for permitting the recent anti-foreign demonstrations which aroused the apprehension of the American government. Official notification of Carranza's action reached here today.

R. L. SMITH IS FREE

DIVORCED WIFE RELENTS ON PROMISE TO PAY

Was Confronted With Term in Jail Until She Agreed to Give Him a Chance to Provide

R. L. Smith of the Merchants Cafe who was arrested yesterday on the charge of failure to pay \$25 per month for the support of his divorced wife and children, was unable to furnish the \$200 bond as required by Justice Pennock for his appearance before the grand jury. He made strenuous endeavors to do so but failed.

Later he appealed to Justice Pennock and Constable Cox and finally to his divorced wife for clemency. He promised to work steadily and make a payment every week if they would arrange to give him his freedom instead of sending him to jail. On this promise, the former wife relented and Justice Pennock gave him his freedom on his own recognizance.

BRITISH LANDING

GETS TROOPS ASHORE ON THE GALLIOLI PENINSULA

Take 650 Prisoners and A Number of Machine Guns from the Turks, Report Says

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PARIS, Aug. 14.—An official communication says: "On the Gallipoli Peninsula the British forces, since August 6th have been debarking successfully near Suvla Bay on the west side of the Peninsula. Further south they gained a footing on the slopes of the Sari Basir height. They took 650 prisoners and nine machine guns. At south of the peninsula, the efforts of the Turks to penetrate our lines failed. August 7 we made slight progress."

U. S. CONSUL ACTS

ASSUMES INTEREST OF ENGLAND AT RIGA, RUSSIAN PORT

Matter is Reported by Ambassador at Petrograd But No Explanation Given

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—The American consul at Riga has taken over the British interests there. Ambassador Marye so reported today from Petrograd, but gave no explanation.

ATTACK IRON WORKS

FRENCH CRUISER SHELLS A FACTORY AT JAFFA RECENTLY

Claim Plant Was Making Arms and Boats For An Attack on Suez Canal

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Official statement says: "August 12th, after a warning had been given the governor of Jaffa and time given for evacuation of the vicinity, a French cruiser bombarded and destroyed the shops of the German foundry, which was making arms and constructing boats destined for attack on the Suez canal."
