## News of World's Greatest War Day by Day

### LIKELY TO ESCAPE LOST 35 AIRSHIPS

**RELIEF IS RUSSIAN ARMY WILL GET AWAY**

Italians and Austrians Both Report Having Made Gains in the Fighting

(By Associated Press from Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Late reports give rise to the belief in the capitals of the entente powers that the safe escape of the main body of the Russian forces from the Warsaw salient is assured through the stout resistance being offered by the wings of the Russian army.

Rome reports a complete repulse of simultaneous attacks by the Austrians through two mountain passes 10,000 feet or more high in the Furva Valley zone.

Vienna reports the repulse of Italian attacks on the Dobordo plateau and near Zagora.

On the Western front numerous small engagements continue without material change in the line.

**THAT NUMBER OF THE GERMAN FLEET DESTROYED**

One Frenchman Managed to Bring Three to the Ground in Short Time

PARIS, Aug. 14.—During the first year of war, so far as accounts have been rendered to the public, 35 German flying machines, not including dirigible balloons were brought to earth and destroyed by French airmen. The day he was obliged to alight behind the German lines and was taken prisoner, Roland Garros, the well known civilian aviator, set the record with three machines on his credit. He has since been surpassed by a lieutenant who has brought down four.

Garros used a special armament planned by himself with a machine gun regulated to fire across the axis of the propeller. In the first ten days with this machine he brought down his three victims.

What a single airman is able to accomplish against land forces is indicated by the case of an adjutant, reported by Jacques Mortane, sporting writer and a volunteer in the aviation corps, as having in a single day dropped 12 3/4-inch shells and 3,000 steel carts upon batteries of mortars that he destroyed at Urorey, 8 shells and 4,000 darts on the general headquarters at Thiaucourt, 4 shells and 2,000 darts on Pagny-sur-Moselle, 4 shells and 2,000 darts at Pannes and 4 shells and 2,000 darts at Chamblay—a total of 32 shells and 18,000 darts.

It is generally impossible for the airman to know exactly what damage he has done, except in the case where bombs cause conflagrations. In various ways, however, details of the results of some bombardments have become known. At the headquarters of the German Crown Prince at Rivry, October 22, 15 men were killed and 36 horses and 22 men wounded. The men were mostly officers. At the general headquarters of Emperor William, November 1, two of the Emperor's aides-camp were killed. In the destruction of a military train at Zebruge, December 17, 40 soldiers were killed and 100 wounded. At the headquarters of the Prince of Wurtemberg General Garneck and two lieutenant generals were killed. On May 21, the airmen killed 14 soldiers and wounded 30 at the German camp at Gontrade.

Official details have been given of over 100 air attacks upon German camps, aerodromes, railway communications, etc., but they are only a part of what the attacking flying corps has done. It often happens that the raider does not come back to render account. How many of the French airmen have been brought down it is impossible to state; the French give out no figures of their losses. A number of accidents are known, however, and among them some that give a vivid impression of the dangers run by the bombing section of the flying corps. A captain was about to take the air for a raid, and the machine gun man with him, was preparing a shell at 1,800 meters high, when he awkwardly let it fall upon the frame. The shock exploded the projectile and blew the apparatus and men to pieces.

A similar accident occurred to an English aviator. While he was taking aboard his supply of ammunition a bomb fell to the ground, exploded, destroyed the machine, the pilot and 12 machinists who were standing by.

Another aeronaut, caught in the clouds on a severely cold day came out at a height of 1200 yards, so benumbed that he lost control of his machine and fell to his death.

A lieutenant was reconnoitering with an observer whose scarf became unwound in the wind and caught in the propeller, precipitating the machine to the ground.

**GERMAN PAPER SCARCE**

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—As one means of reducing the price of printing paper, the authorities have concluded to remove the duty on mechanically and chemically prepared cellulose. Sweden and Austria-Hungary are the largest exporters of this material to Germany.

## Lawn and Garden Sprinkling

Everyone who expects to use water for lawn or garden sprinkling is required to sign an application and make payment before using any water for this purpose. The rate fixed by the Railroad Commission for sprinkling is \$1.00 per month for each 5000 square feet (50 by 100-foot lot, or less, building space included. Payment of four months, or \$4.00 in advance allows use for one year in advance for lawn sprinkling, washing windows, porches, etc., but if paid by the month use is only allowed during the month paid.

The rules filed with the Railroad Commission require that payment be made in advance each month before using same and that sprinkling be done only between 6 and 8 o'clock, morning and evening. No reduction in rates will be allowed in case water is not required for sprinkling every day of the month. If water is used for sprinkling without payment having been made in advance or outside of sprinkling hours, the service may be entirely shut off and not turned on until \$1.00 penalty has been paid.
