Coos Will Soon Be Penniless. Last year, Assessor Thrift informs us, the people of Coos county were reasonably well fixed for cash returns of \$10,869 for taxation. It is true that seems a small cash balance on which to do the millions of dollars of business annually done in this county; but this year fifty per cent of that amount has disappeared and only \$5,220 has been returned. Should the drop be as great in another year apparently our people will be left penniless. DEPARTMENTS MAY COMBINE IN WORK

Plan on Foot to Co-ordinate Forestry Service and Fish and Game Commission

(Special to The Times.) SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—At the regular meeting of the fish and game commission held at Salem, steps were taken to co-ordinate two departments of the state service and the U. S. forest service in the matter of game protection, prevention of forest fires, and the distribution of trout fry, birds and game animals.

S. C. Bartram, forest supervisor of Roseburg, in a long talk before the commission, outlined a plan whereby duplication of work can be eliminated and a great saving made not only in the expense of carrying on the work of these different branches, but in preventing loss of fish by improper handling and careless selection of streams for planting.

State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker also outlined a co-operative plan in his report to the commission that will correlate well with that outlined by Br. Bartram. The governor, who is ex-officio chairman of the fish and game commission, appointed State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker, Forest Supervisor S. C. Bartram and State Forester F. A. Elliott as a committee to devise a comprehensive plan of co-operation. These gentlemen will meet for this purpose in the near future.
