HAD PAID COQUILLE HOTEL BOARD BILL

Three Men Brought Back From Roseburg Quickly Dismissed by Justice Stanley—Other Case

The Coquille Herald says: "The case of the State of Oregon against E. H. Grigware, B. J. Grigware and I. W. Larsen, came to a very sudden termination before Justice Stanley when it developed that Mrs. Nora Wilkinson, the private prosecutor, had received payment for the board bill which she had charged them with jumping.

The parties had roomed at the Traveler's Rest for about three weeks while looking for employment here. Being unable to find work they started for Roseburg, where they were acquainted, promising to send the amount they owed Mrs. Wilkinson upon arriving there. As soon as they arrived they raised the money and sent the amount of their bill to Mrs. Wilkinson. In the meantime she had sworn out a warrant and the men were brought back for this morning before Justice Stanley. The fact that the lady had received her money was unknown to the presiding judge until the lady was placed on the stand. She stated that she had notified Sheriff Johnson of the fact, and why the county was put to the expense of bringing witnesses before the justice does not appear.

Charles Smith is being examined on a charge preferred by Landlord Young of the Baxter Hotel, who had reason to believe that he was about to skip to San Francisco, leaving a \$20 deficit in his board bill. Mr. Young states that other cases are on the way, as he has become weary of being beaten out of board bills and has sworn out some other warrants, in which cases the arrests have not been made.

BACK FOR A VISIT WOULD SHIP FREE

FATHER OF VISITORS EARLY COOS BAY PIONEER S. P. WOULD ALLOW FAIR EXHIBITS TO TRAVEL FREE

Petition Now Being Considered—If Granted Coos Bay May Have Big Display at Myrtle Point

After an absence of 31 years Allan A. Lobree, son of Abe Lobree who owned one of the first saw mills on Coos Bay and the first mill in Bay City, accompanied by his wife arriving here last evening from San Francisco for a visit. He was accompanied by M. Wallenstein and wife, formerly Miss Adele Lobree, and S. K. Herzog and wife, who was Rebelah Lobree.

Both Mrs. Wallenstein and Mrs. Herzog were born in Marshfield, though they left here for San Francisco when they were quite young. Mr. Herzog is the mayor of San Rafael and prominent in business there. This is his first visit to Coos Bay. Mrs. Wallenstein was back here seven or eight years ago, but she says that even in this time there has been a decided change in the appearance of Coos Bay.

Mr. Lobree is now with the Great Western Smelting and Refining Company, of San Francisco. Today he met many old friends of the family and was quite busy trying to pick out old familiar spots, one of these being the Blanco Hotel where he was born. His father was one of the first merchants in Marshfield. He built his store on a dock, the same site now taken up by Lando's store. Until his death in about 1875 he conducted both the store and the mill and following his death Mrs. Lobree ran the mill for a year, then selling out to E. B. Dean and company. She now lives in San Francisco.

The party came in over the Roseburg-Myrtle Point road and expect to remain here for five or six days visiting points of interest on the bay and meeting with old friends of the family.

"The last time I was here," said Mr. Lobree, "most of Central avenue was a mass of saw dust and slab wood. This doesn't look like the same place and it's hard for me to find many of the old landmarks." The Lobree family still have some property interests on Coos Bay which they are looking after while here.

Morrisey Here.—E. F. Morrisey, formerly with the Coos Bay Paving Company, arrived here yesterday from California to look after business interests.

Free transportation to the county Fair at Myrtle Point, of all exhibits, including the live stock, is being considered by the Southern Pacific officials. Through W. F. Miller, superintendent of the Coos Bay, Roseburg and Eastern, J. L. Smith, county agriculturist, is presenting the query and word is expected soon from the Portland office of the company. It is said that chances are very good that the petition will be granted.

Should this be so it is believed that Coos Bay, for practically the first time, will be represented at Myrtle Point, September 8, 9, 10 and 11, with live stock exhibits. Previously the cost has been exorbitant and the farmers felt unable to show. Not only may the shipping be free, but the Fair Association some time ago agreed that all stock at the Fair shall be fed free of charge. This means no expense for any farmer in the county to show his beef and dairy cattle at Myrtle Point.

And as a further inducement \$200 has been appropriated by the Association for special dairy prizes. This is in addition to the regular premium list. Mr. Smith is making every effort to get the farmers and dairymen of Coos Bay and up in the Ten Mile district to bring their stock over for display and show what can and is being done in this section. But not only is the live stock considered. All vegetable displays and grains are wanted and good sized premiums are being offered for the exhibits of these types.

Arrangements have been made with the Bankers Mortgage Corporation of this state to lend several thousand dollars on improved farm lands. Only requirement is that a small percentage of the loan be invested in stock of said corporation after being satisfied such is a good investment. No Commissions charged for negotiating the loan.
