MARSHFIELD EASTERN STAR TO GO IN FORCE TO COQUILLE

Natal Day of Order on Tuesday Will Draw Members From All Cities of Coos County

Having once won the silver loving cup for having the greatest percentage of their total membership present on Natal Day, the local members of the Eastern Star lodge say they expect to be in Coquille next Tuesday 75 strong. From North Bend, the youngest chapter in the county, comes the report that they will take a full fifty to the county seat and that they intend to bring back the cup.

At a special meeting of Der's Chapter No. 53 of the Eastern Star last evening in the Masonic temple, Associate Matron Mrs. Dora J. Schilke, of La Grande, was present to see the work put on. SEELEY IS CAPTAIN

PILOT OF BAR DREDGE MICHE PROMOTED TO SKIPPERSHIP

Captain Robert Jones Comes as New Pilot—Dredge Beached for Repairs After Making Record

Captain George Seeley was today appointed by Captain James Polhemus, government engineer, as skipper of the bar dredge Michie, taking the place of Captain Reed, resigned. Captain Robert Jones, for 20 years prominent in marine circles of Coos Bay, is expected here tonight to take the position as pilot of the Michie, in place of Captain Seeley.

These changes will take place at once and the men will be at their new posts when the dredge goes out on Monday.

In the 28 days of this month the dredge Michie has removed more than 200,000 cubic yards of sand from the bar and there are still two more days in August to operate. According to Captain Polhemus this is by far the best record ever made by the dredge.

Some time yesterday the crew noticed that the suction pipe brought up from the bottom several bolts and it was found that they were from the pipe that travels down inside the dredge arm. At 2:30 this morning at low water, the dredge was beached below Empire and the missing bolts were again put in place and at noon the craft was afloat again and this afternoon went out on the bar.

Captain Seeley came to the Michie with the best of references. He has been here as pilot since early in May. For 25 years he has been master of vessels, all but five years being put in on this coast. Just previous to coming to Coos Bay he was captain of the government mine planter Ringold in the mines and fortifications district including the Columbia, Puget Sound and Honolulu. He has proved himself a steady and efficient captain and is very well liked on the bay and by his crew.

CLAIM DOGS USED BASEBALL SCORE

CLAUDE NOBLE, OF TEN MILE, ARRESTED

\$250 Bond Is Put Up For Appearance—Deputy Game Warden Thomas is Very Busy

Claude Noble, of the Ten Mile country, was arrested today after a complaint had been filed against him by Deputy Game Warden Thomas on a charge of running deer with dogs. Ed Siestrem went his bond for \$250 and Noble will appear in the Justice Court September 1 to answer to the charge. A special game officer sent in the information, officer No. 199, for his name was not given and J. D. Tower and John Waters were named as witnesses.

It was said that the officer heard the dogs barking through the brush and laid in wait until a young spiked buck came running to him, almost exhausted, coming so close that the man put his hands on it.

Deputy Game Warden Thomas declared that he has known for two weeks that parties in that section were using dogs, but this is the first time he could get hold of the evidence. He was in there within the past ten days and returned last evening from a hurried trip to Curry County.

He was incensed on hearing that dogs have been used, saying that this method of hunting is particularly hard on the deer and results in slaughters, very often, well over the limit.

Down in Curry, close to the Coos County line, he found that several hunters have been in shooting on the deer reserve near the head of Two Mile and on Bear Creek. He said a new deputy has been stationed in Curry lately.

The game warden is sending urgent letters to the State Department, asking them to at least match him dollar for dollar in his expenditures for special deputies. Too often the costs come out of his own pocket, particularly so since the repealing of the law, just lately, granting half the funds to the special officers. Now they must work with rewards as their pay, and this method is proving highly inefficient for men cannot be secured when and where they are most needed.
