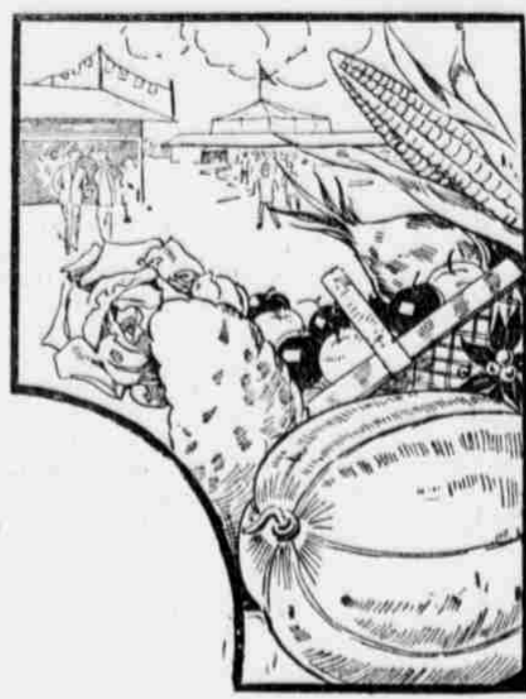




# Fair Week

### MAKING GOOD ROAD

BUILDING MACADAM HIGHWAY OUT OF MYRTLE POINT

Apparently Will Be One of the Best Plans of Road Construction in the County

(Special to The Times)  
MYRTLE POINT, Ore., Sept. 7.—A new stretch of roadway near Myrtle Point which is now being made, apparently will be an entirely successful one and may prove to be a solution of the road making problem. In a distance of several miles improvement is being made on the road out of the city which extends to the forks, one of which leads to Powers and the other up the middle fork of the Coquille river over which the Roseburg mail stages travel.

**Macadam Highway**  
The new roadway is practically a macadam highway. The road was first graded and then covered with gravel. Over this was placed coarse rocks broken to the size of an egg or larger. Over a thick layer of this sized rock was placed a top dressing of finely cracked rock.

The top covering is heavily watered and then rolled with a big steam roller. The water and roller pressure causes the fine rock to cement to a considerable degree and as far as the roadway has been completed it appears to be a fine hard road, equal to most paved streets.

**Will be Good Test**  
The work is being done by the county. As to the lasting qualities of the pavement under heavy traffic time will tell but there seems no reason why the road should not be a substantial one. This particular stretch of road will be a good test as all the traffic, both to Powers and Roseburg must pass over it, so if it will withstand this travel it will do in any part of the county.

**Find Hard Rock**  
This class of road, the builders say, could not be a success without a very heavy steam roller or without a good quality of rock. The material used on the road is a rock found near Myrtle Point which is of a particularly hard variety. It is said that it is the hardest rock yet used on any of the Coos county roads. At the same time when ground up fine the dust seems to have the property of cementing when wet and rolled.

**Makes Good Highway**  
The new road is sufficiently wide for teams or autos to pass each other with ease. If it has the lasting qualities that are hoped for and if the road can be maintained in its new condition it is as good a hard surface pavement as could be desired. However it would be useless to attempt the construction of such a road in a district where a heavy steam roller could not be used.

**Port Orford Carnival Pavilion is to be Preserved**

#### FREE TROUT GIVEN

Several Million from McKenzie River Are Ready

Cans will be furnished free, to be returned to the hatchery, and full instructions will be given by the superintendent as to placing them in the streams.
