NEWS OF OREGON

SALEM—W. W. Elder, commandant of the Oregon Soldiers' Home at Roseburg for the last 12 years, will be removed October 1. He will be succeeded by Robert C. Markee, of Portland.

EUGENE—A herd of elk was seen near the city and the authorities are trying to find the hunter who killed one last month. EUGENE—Horses are being shipped from Eugene at the rate of 20 a day, presumably for the British army, and the prices paid range from \$60 to \$175 per head.

FLORENCE—The estate of the late O. W. Hurd has sued the Hurd Lumber Company for \$1500 alleged to be due. MEDFORD—Ed G. Brown was injured when a rifle which he was testing exploded in his hand.

SALEM—The Shriners will hold a gathering October 2 during the State Fair week. PENDLETON—It has been decided not to transfer the Round-up show this year to the San Francisco exposition, but it will be held at Pendleton September 23, 24 and 25.

FLORENCE—The salmon cannery will be opened if the fishermen decide to accept the price offered for fish, which is 12 1/2 cents a pound. SALEM—Roy King has filed suit asking for the annulment of his marriage to Bertha King, alleging that it occurred before she had been divorced from her former husband six months, and alleging that his wife went joy riding with other men.

GLENDALE—A tract of land near Glendale has been thrown open for entry by homesteaders and is said to include some good farming land. EUGENE—County Judge Brown says there is no money available for advertising Lane County at the exposition.

ALBANY—The football team organized by Albany College for this season is the strongest the institution has ever had out for the state honors. CRESWELL—L. C. Morris, a wealthy resident of Creswell, died of dropsy at his home, aged 62 years.

JUNCTION CITY—Ira Gilstrap had his face badly mangled in an accident while repairing an electric elevator in an undertaking establishment. SPRINGFIELD—At the auto camping grounds a shower bath has been established for the free use of tourists who stop there.

ROSEBURG—The pruned drier on the ranch of T. A. Findlay near Roseburg was destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$1700 to the building and 1500 pounds of dried prunes. GEDSPORT—Warren P. Reed is building a private telephone line from Gedspert to Winchester Bay, giving the latter place outside communication.

GARDNER—A deer which had apparently been run by dogs until exhausted, drowned in the Umpqua River when frightened by people on shore. PORTLAND—Carl F. List, a Portland boy, took refuge on the German submarine U-39 when a vessel on which was a sailor was torpedoed.

ROSEBURG—T. W. Winneford, who has resided in Douglas County for the past forty years, died at his home on the Calapalapa. UNION—Michey Carroll, two year old son of Joe Carroll, drowned in Catherine Creek when he fell into deep water while playing.

QUINABY—Hop pickers employed in the fields struck for more pay and were ordered to leave by the employers. SEASIDE—Harry Thompson, a one-armed messenger boy employed at the S. P. depot, met with further misfortune by falling and breaking his leg in two places.

SALEM—It has been found that there is a mistake in a bill passed by the Legislature prohibiting stock running at large in Marion County and the law is probably of no value. SALEM—Willamette University will open September 13 with 34 instructors, many of whom are new at the college.

ASTORIA—The dedication of the port dock at Astoria is made the feature of the big regatta ball. PENDLETON—Mrs. Edith Hughes is indicted by the grand jury on a charge of burning her husband's home.

OREGON CITY—Officials of the Warwick Paving Company have been threatened with arrest by the State Labor Commission for violating the eight-hour law. GARDNER—The schools of Gardner will not open until September 13 as the school board has been unable to get the high school quarters in repair before that time.

EUGENE—W. E. Smith, who is familiar with snakes, recommends the application of black gun powder to a rattlesnake bite after first opening the wound. PORTLAND—C. W. Ray was killed, his son and daughter injured and his wife slightly hurt when a train struck their auto on a crossing near Troutdale. The auto stopped on the crossing, the engine going dead.

COLLECTED BIG SUM

FOREST SERVICE MAKE ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT Over Two Million Dollars Taken In and Part Reverts to Timbered Counties

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 7.—According to figures just compiled and issued in the report of the Chief of the Division of Accounts, Forest Service, Washington, D. C., the receipts from all sources for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, were \$2,491,469. Of this amount, 25 percent of \$609,803, revert to the States in which the National Forests are located.

The total receipts from all sources in District 6 (Washington, Oregon and Alaska) were \$346,280. Of this total, \$206,446 was from timber sales, \$120,210 for grazing fees, \$8,303 from special uses, and \$10,022 from water power rentals. The total receipts for Alaska were \$44,662, for Oregon \$198,793, and for Washington \$149,782. According to the existing law, the following sums will revert to the States for distribution to the Counties in which the forests lie:

Alaska \$11,165.75 Oregon 49,675.83 Washington 37,445.56 Total \$98,287.14 In addition to this, 10 percent of the income will be used for the building of roads within the forests as follows: Alaska \$4,466.30 Oregon 19,870.33 Washington 14,978.23 Total \$39,314.86

By states, Montana leads in the volume of business on the National forests, with Idaho second and California third. In Montana and Idaho the timber sale business is the heaviest; Colorado leads in grazing receipts; while California is far ahead of the other States in receipts from water power rentals and special uses. By districts, No. 1 (Montana, Idaho and part of the Dakotas) leads in total receipts and in timber sales; District 3 (New Mexico and Arizona) leads in special uses and District 4 (Wyoming, Nevada and some portions of adjoining States) leads in grazing business.

CHARGES ARE DENIED Miss Grace Elder at Roseburg Comes Into Notice (Special to The Times) ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 7.—Miss Grace Elder, daughter of the commandant of the Old Soldiers' Home who was removed from office by Governor Withycombe, denies the charge made that she was drawing pay from the state while employed with other work.

Captain R. C. Markee, commandant-elect of the Home, is a Union soldier who marched with Sherman to the sea and who cast his first vote for Abraham Lincoln. Mr. Markee resided in Portland where he was engaged in the jewelry business.

WILL PRESENT PLAN Clackamas County Has Scheme for Disposition of Land OREGON CITY, Sept. 7.—Clackamas county will be represented at the O. & C. land conference by a delegation headed by C. Schuebel and will present a scheme for the disposition of the land.

Mr. Schuebel has outlined a plan. He believes the state should buy the land from the railroads at \$2.50 an acre and then sell it to actual settlers. The profit made by the state, he suggests, should be applied to the school fund. With this plan, he said, the state would make a profit on the land and settlers would secure homesteads at a reasonable figure. He believes that the timber should be marketed separately from the land and in cases where the stump land is not fit for agricultural purposes, it should be reforested.

In case this plan is found impracticable, he urges that the federal government buy the land and sell it to actual settlers, turning the profits over to the school fund.
