No Mail Arrives.—The mail did not arrive last evening on the train from Myrtle Point and at the Post-office it was believed that there was another breakdown along the road that made the auto truck miss the night train. The mail arrived this noon from Roseburg.

No Council Last Night.—There was no meeting of the city fathers last evening. The members who went to Portland last Sunday, taking in the incinerator plant it is proposed the city shall buy for \$25,000, failed to return in time and the meeting is postponed until next Monday evening.

Boost Road Bonds.—President Morrison of the Coos County Good Roads Association is expected to issue calls for a meeting to be held in Coquille a week from tomorrow, September 16. Plans for a big boost-meeting during the North Bend Bridge Carnival and for rejuvenating the old association to aid in the proposed \$370,000 bond election will be taken up.

Was Not Lost.—Chief Anderson of North Bend was last night looking for C. C. Dana, one of the railroad construction men who was missing. It was feared that he had met with some accident. The man however turned up all right. He was not lost but had taken a little excursion on his own account to the hills and had not left any word where he was going.

Arm is Dislocated.—Dorothy, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. A. Baines, of South Fifth street, dislocated her right arm at the elbow late yesterday afternoon, as the result of falling from the fence. Dr. Dix was called, who administered anaesthetic and set the arm in a very few minutes. The little girl will have to keep her arm in a sling for about three weeks.

Reserve Subpoenas.—Constable Cox today is busier than the proverbial bee, reserving the subpoenas given out by him last week. He says that the papers sent from the district attorney's office were dated for next week and that is the time he summoned all witnesses to appear before the old grand jury. He was notified yesterday that they must all be there this week, hence his hurry and many explanations, though only one fee is allowed for the serving.
