Band Goes To Fair.—The Coos Bay Concert Band, under the leadership of Director R. N. Fenton, left on the early morning train for the county fair at Myrtle Point where they have been engaged for a three-days session, going over 22 strong.

To Survey Site.—Fred Gettins will start tomorrow making a survey of the proposed radio site on Coal Bank Inlet. An accurate map of the tract and its surroundings will be made by him and also photographs will be taken, all of which will be an aid in the planning of the station, which probably will be done in Mare Island.

Recovers Keys.—Miss Helen Lesh, in charge of Dr. Kelly's office, today recovered her ring of office keys. Mr. McArthur plans to leave soon to spend the winter with his family in Colorado and Mr. Drews will take the business management of the company and Mr. Pugsley will retain the factory management. It is proposed to enlarge the business.

Save for Dry Year.—Judge Pennock and Constable Cox every few days dig out a long-necked bottle of amber fluid that late in January was brought to them by a Government officer to hold as evidence in an Empire case, which involved the sale of liquor to an Indian named Burns. The evidence has not yet been called for. The Judge says he expects to save the bottle until Oregon goes dry and then maybe, it will go up in value.

All of them were clear and showed the Rainbow coming down stream with a big load aboard. The photographer on the same trip had visited Camp 1 and came back with some unusual pictures of logging operations, one of them showing the road of 27 percent grade.
