WHISTLES TO CREW SEASON WILL OPEN

LIFE GUARD CREW SPENDS NIGHT WITH BUOY

Captain Britt Tells of Fast Trip to Aid Grace Dollar—35 Hours in Small Boat

Whistling buoys are all right in their place, but to bob about in the waves all night along side of one—well that's a different proposition.

The boat left the station down the bay at 2:20 Sunday afternoon, said the captain and six hours later were off the Sluslaw bar 41 miles away.

It was seen that the crew believed they had been sent to the wrong place and that they should have gone to the mouth of the Columbia.

And it was off the Sluslaw bar that the life guard became intimately acquainted with the whistling buoy that entertained them with ear splitting shrieks until 6:15 the next morning.

Captain Britt said that the suffered little inconvenience in the small boat. They had provisions with them. The trip back was made in five minutes less time than the voyage up the coast.

ROGUE FISHERMEN START AFTER SALMON IN MORNING

Matt L. May, Amateur Autoist, Negotiates Curry Roads Without a Mishap

Salmon fishing season opens again on the Rogue tomorrow morning, according to Matt L. May who has just returned in his new Ford from a week's trip into Curry and southern Coos.

Fishing closed down August 25 until September 10 to allow the fish to spawn. This also gave the cannerymen a brief respite from one of the most strenuous seasons of years which had kept them so busy that often dozens of big fish were shoved through the floors, the plants being unable to care for them.

Because of the shoaling in of the bar the several thousand cases of salmon, about 14,000, have not all been shipped to Coos Bay. The Rustler came out a few days ago but was not able to take a cargo and the Roamer is still inside.

No Machine Troubles

Though he never before has run a machine Mr. May said his register showed a total of 386 miles and without a particle of trouble. Sandy roads, he said, were easy.

Curry enjoys venison three times a day—they eat so much of it down there that many care little for it and during his trip Mr. May said that he averaged venison about once or twice a day or he considered he had been slighted.

Following the court decisions of Judge Catkins little trouble is expected on the Rogue when the new salmon season opens, he said.
