Receive Big Map.—A large wall map has been received at the Chamber of Commerce showing the Southern Pacific holdings in the United States and tracing out the lines and the proposed extensions. This map is authentic and will be valuable as a source of information.

Big Check to Port.—A check for \$1,105.06 has been received by the Port Commission from the Bennett Trust Company in payment for their fill received in Bennett's Addition in North Marshfield. The Commissioners declare that they have a place already picked out in which to get rid of the check.

To Open Bungalow.—Several teachers of the city are intending to re-open The Bungalow on Ninth street again this year. Miss Grace Griffin and Miss Ethel Reese arrived yesterday to open the house for the year. Several other teachers will take up their residence there.

To Consider Building.—The Elks Lodge expects in two weeks to have a meeting given over to consideration of the proposed \$25,000 lodge temple. In the meantime an effort is to be made to sell a certain amount of bonds. The building committee is hard at work on the new proposition which they say will be carried through successfully.

Advocates Peace.—Many copies of publications put out by the American Association for International Conciliation are being received by local readers. They are furnished free of charge by this society, with headquarters in New York, whose purpose is to boost that of international peace. The documents are issued monthly and are designed to furnish brief but authoritative statements of various aspects of international relations.

Need Flat Cars.—To aid further in the construction of the Willamette Pacific north of Coos Bay, four flat cars were yesterday taken down the bay on a large scow. They will be used by the construction crew in first ballasting and later to carry steel north of the trestle work on North Lake at which point track laying has ceased, while the piling is being driven and which is expected to be finished some time in October. The big cars were loaded aboard a scow on which rails had been laid on top of several tiers of ties.
