French reports state that the German right wing is still retreating before the allies in France and guns, men and stores are said to have been captured.

Sel'm, in Austria, across the river from Belgrade, has been taken by the Serbians.

The Russian general staff announced that Tomaszow, in Russian Poland, has been taken after a desperate struggle.

A naval battle between the German and Russian squadrons is reported to be in progress off the Aland Islands at the entrance of the Gulf of Bothnia.

A German destroyer captured the Finnish mail steamer Uleaborg. A British cruiser captured the Hamburg-American liner Berthania and took it to Kingston, Jamaica.

President Poincare of France denies to President Wilson that his troops are using dum-dum bullets.

The Bank of France removes safely its treasure of one billion dollars in gold from Paris.

## GERMANS MOVE ON

VON MACKENSEN PUSHING VIGOROUSLY TOWARD PISK

No Important Developments Reported at London From Either East or West Front

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, Sept. 11.—No important developments are reported either in the Eastern or Western fronts. Von Mackensen is still pushing vigorously through the Pripiet marshes toward Pisk, Russia. North and south of his headquarters a strong offensive movement developed near Grodno and on the road to Rovno.

Petrograd claims another success in Galicia, resulting in the capture of 5,000 men. Sharp fighting is in progress along the Austro-Italian front. In the west, the artillery duels continue.

## DENIED AT BERLIN

GERMAN AMBASSADOR CLAIMS DID NOT USE ARCHIBALD

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—German Ambassador Von Bernstorff emphatically denied today that he had used or attempted to use, James P. J. Archibald, the American messenger of the Austrian Ambassador, as a message bearer to Berlin.

"I did not use Archibald as a messenger chiefly because I did not think it safe, and he certainly did not prove safe," said Von Bernstorff.

## FOUL PLAY MAYBE

WILD MAN CALLS POLICE TO PINE STREET IN HURRY

A fitting sequel to the Diamond Dick story of the "Mud Dobber Lady" who traveled about the Eastside flats at night when all was still is the happening of yesterday afternoon which breezed up in a quiet moment, stirred the police station and then all was calm and serene again.

Late in the afternoon of yesterday the "phone in the police station rang. Chief Carter answered and the voice of an excited man commanded him to come at once to 346 First street, and that it was absolutely necessary to hurry.

The Chief got all excited, grabbed his Springtime Panama, and almost ran up the stairs to old Pine street. There was not a thing stirring on the street. He called at 346 and there was told of how a little short and fat man, prepping and half out of his head, had rushed into the hall of the house, grabbed the 'phone and called an officer.

A full investigation of the case was made but who the man was, what he wanted, whether he killed anyone or whether he had been threatened or had fought with John Barleycorn is still unknown.

Further reports, later in the evening, evidenced the fact that somewhere on First street late yesterday a man had come running out of a house, followed by a young woman who screamed at the top of her voice for help. It is believed this is the man who came rushing to the telephone.

Jack Carter says that this and the "Mud Dobber Lady" are two cases and that probably J. W. Mitchell will be called to ferret them out.

## FIND MINE A FAKE

\$2,000 LOST ON CLAIM BOUGHT FROM MAN NOT OWNER

Joel Ostlund and G. Norback Cause Arrest of E. D. Myers—Located in Nevada After Long Search

Victims of a crooked mining deal in which they paid \$1,000 cash for a claim which was not the property of the seller, Joel Ostlund and G. Norback have caused the arrest in Nevada of E. D. Myers for whom the officers have been on the watch for the last five months. The capture was made on information supplied by the sheriff of Vale county. Myers will be brought back to Coquille for trial. His case has been taken up by the grand jury.

Early in February the young men purchased about 40 acres from Myers, buying it as mining property. It is situated a short distance below Whiskey Run and borders the coast. They had known the man for several months and believed him to be honest.

He showed them supposedly rich platinum streaks on the land which many years ago had been extensively mined for gold. The earth assayed \$4.90 a ton. Now the men believe that the ground had been salted for them for later work brought them no results.

Myers brought out his filing papers, entered at Coquille, and also receipts for his assessment work to prove he owned the land. Some time in March Ostlund and Norback went to the place of A. W. Fahy, near Bandon and he told them the land belonged to himself and a man named Morrison and that he had deeds.

Already the miners had put approximately \$1,000 above the purchase price into machinery. They abandoned the claim and went mining down on the beach. Myers, who is about 56 years of age, had left the country. The officers were told and a quiet search was instituted and only five days ago did the word come that the man had been located in northern Nevada.

Both Ostlund and Norback are quite cheery in spite of their loss. They are in hopes that Myers has some of the money left. A civil suit will also be brought against him for the recovery of the purchase price and damages.

With this matter properly straightened out Joel Ostlund is intending to leave for his old home in Sweden to see his father who is quite feeble.

## CASE IS DISMISSED

CIRCUIT COURT HAS NO JURISDICTION IN TAX MATTER

Southern Oregon Company Wanted \$160,000 on Deposit Returned by the County

COQUILLE, Ore., Sept. 11.—The case of the Southern Oregon company against the county, in which the company seeks to have returned \$160,000 which was deposited as tax money, was dismissed by Judge Skippworth for want of jurisdiction. It was held that another case on the same question was now pending in the United States court and that the circuit court did not have jurisdiction to act.

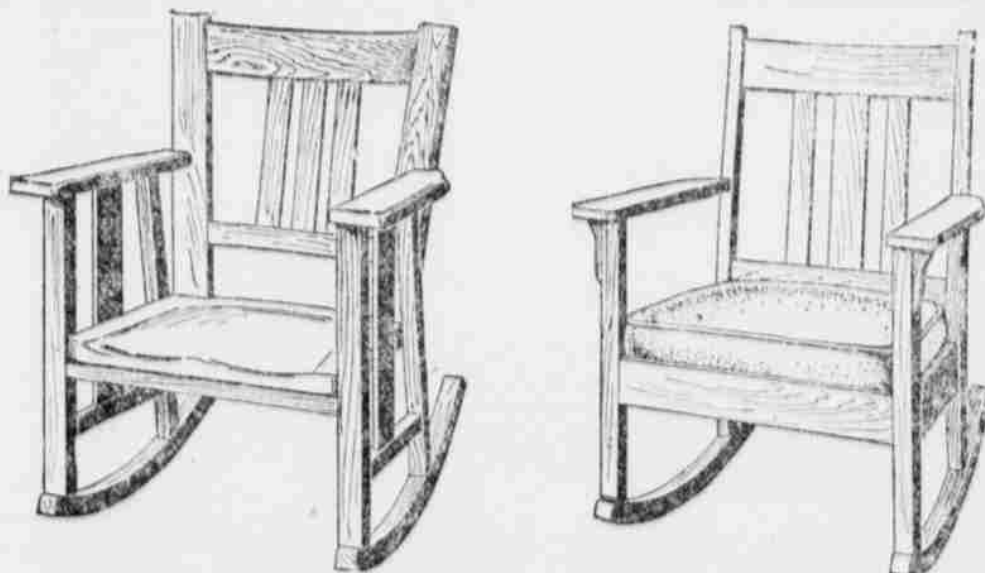
