IMPORTANT MEETINGS

THERE are two important conferences to be held this week in which Coos County is vitally interested. Both are scheduled for Wednesday, September 16, 1915. One will be held in Salem and the other in Coquille. The one at Salem is a conference over the Oregon-Washington land grant and the one in Coquille is for the reorganization of the Coos County Good Roads Association.

Both present problems that are vital to the progress of the com-While the land grant conference involves more wealth, it is to be doubted if it is of more concern to the residents of Coos County than the road problem.

HE diverse interests involved in the disposal of the railroad granted lands are already clamoring for their various selfish ends. There are signs that an effort is being made to control the conference and forward to Congress not the konest expression people, but the expression of a controlled clique fixed to do the bidding of those dominated by selfish With millions involved interests. this was to be expected, but the people should be aroused to the importance of the movement that is meant to wrest from them the splendid victory they have won in the Supreme Court.

The sub-committee on rules is said to be formulating arrangements for control of the conference and its expression in advance of the session. This committee announces who shall be the speakers and by the invitational power proposes to control what is said. Careful preparations are being made that nothing shall interfere with the prearranged program.
