Aided in Treating Villa Wounded at Nogales—Americans Well Received and Mines Running After an eventful trip that took him 400 miles into Old Mexico and between the fighting lines of Carranza and Villa, Dr. H. E. Kelly has returned to his home in Marshfield.

Saw Actual Fighting The state of Sonora was entered. At Nogales, a seaport and on the border, Dr. Kelly found an army of 4,000 men, the remnant of Villa's once great power, entrenched three and four miles away and somewhat surrounding the town were 4,000 to 5,000 of Carranza's army.
