

Apples may be entered for competition in from one to five box lots, but the Grand Sweepstakes will be awarded to the best five box lot. There will be very strenuous competitions between California, Montana, Idaho, Arkansas, Washington, Missouri and

## Scale of Rating

All entries for apples close November 1st, and the following ratings will be used by the judges in awarding the prize: Quality 26 points, Color 20; Size to run from 80 to Freedom from blemish 20; total 80 points. Pack: Bulge 4 points, aliveness and style of package 8, total
