DOUGLAS TO CLOSE PLAN BIG EXHIBIT

SUNDAY CLOSING LAW TO APPLY IN THAT COUNTY Since Recent Decision District Attorney Orders Everything Not Exempt The Roseburg Review says: As the result of the ruling of the Oregon Supreme Court, in which the constitutionality of the Sunday closing law was upheld by the members of that body, every business establishment in Douglas County, with the exception of those exempted by the law, will be ordered closed on Sunday by District Attorney George Neuner, of this city. The Oregon closing law, which for many years was upheld by the prosecuting officers of the state, provides that it is unlawful to keep open on Sunday, otherwise known as the Lord's day, any store, shop, grocery, bowling alley, billiard room or tipping house, which have for their purpose labor or traffic. A violation of the act carries a fine of from \$50, or a term of imprisonment in the county jail. The law does not apply to the theaters, drug stores, physicians, undertakers, livery stables, butchers or bakeries. It does apply however, to places of amusement.

FRUIT IS NEEDED

WANTED AT EXPOSITION TO MAKE GOOD SHOWING All Who Have Fine Specimens Are Requested to Send Them In Now

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—Those in charge of the Oregon building at the exposition make the following suggestion. If you are a grower of either pears apples or fine vegetables and have even a few choice ones with which you are willing to part, you can help the situation here very materially and assist in interesting the stranger in your particular section. For display purposes in baskets, fifteen or twenty pears of any variety, if they are good looking and of uniform size, will be appreciated immensely. And even six or eight top-notch apples for plate display will make a hit. Pack the fruit well, each specimen by itself, place your name and variety plainly on the box and send by express collect, such charges being paid here providing the box is labeled, Oregon Commission, Oregon Building, Panama-Pacific International Exposition. How to Pack Fruit For competition, pears must be entered in commercial packages only and in two to five box lots, the half box of pears to be figured as commercial pack, and two of these are sufficient for one entry. Apples may be entered for competition in from one to five box lots, but the Grand Sweepstakes will be awarded to the best five box lot. There will be very strenuous competitions between California, Montana, Idaho, Arkansas, Washington, Missouri and Oregon. Scale of Rating All entries for apples close November 1st, and the following ratings will be used by the judges in awarding the prize: Quality 20 points, Color 20; Size 10 to run from 80 to 112 with more of a leaning toward 88 to 96; 10 points; Form 10; Freedom from blemish 20; total 80 points. Pack: Buige 4 points, alignment 4, compactness 4, attractiveness and style of package 8, total 20 points; Grand Total 100 points. Not all growers will care to engage in competition, but doubtless many with superior fruit will be glad to send a small quantity for display purpose, simply that they may say that they exhibited at the great Exposition and helped win laurels for Oregon.
