BUNKERS AT HENRYVILLE ARE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Were Built in 1873 but in Distress Long Time and Became Menace

The old Henryville mine bunkers were burned down last night and this morning. They had become a menace as they were very old and liable to fall over and the owners ordered them fired.

One of the oldest land marks on Isthmus Inlet is removed by the fire. The Henryville mine was opened in 1873 by the Coos Bay-Oregon Coal Company, of which the Southern Pacific owned five-sixths of the stock and L. M. McDonald one-sixth.

In 1874 and 1875 there was more activity at Henryville and Otterville than in Marshfield. The mine is said to be a good one, but after the company had shipped out some coal another mine up north was bought and less attention was given to this one.
