Elected Secretary.—Earl Powell, of Marshfield, was elected secretary of the Coos County Good Roads Association and should be included in the list of officers selected at the big meeting in Coquille on Thursday evening.

Capt. Mercer Buried.—The funeral of Captain Alexander Mercer, of Cooston, was held this morning from the Wilson Undertaking Parlors. The

deceased was 82 years of age, the son of A. R. Mercer, with whom he lived in Cooston, and for 20 years sailed the Great Lakes, in later years as captain of good sized steamboats.
