All Over Oregon

PORTLAND—Leo Cameron, a Portland bartender is charged with leaving chloroformed and beat Mrs. Stella MacNamara, a widow, and of robbing her of \$6,000 in securities and diamonds, and is under arrest.

SALEM—It is stated that there has been an increase of 2,500 in the area of land planted into corn this year as compared to last year.

JUNCTION CITY—Miss Helen Love has been made queen of the Pumphin Show which was held in Junction City.

PORTLAND—A team has been selected from the Oregon National Guard to attend and take part in the national shoot at Jacksonville, Florida.

DALLAS—Rains have eliminated further forest fire dangers and the rangers who have been at work in the woods have been called in.

BUREAU—The postoffice was robbed of \$50 in cash, \$135 in stamps and \$60 in checks.

AGITATION FOR COAST MILITARY ROAD GROWS

Move, Laughed at, Refuses to Down, and Now Is Endorsed by Tri State Roads Convention

When a civil engineer on Puget Sound first came forward with a plan to establish a military highway that would parallel the coast from British Columbia to Mexico his idea was laughed at. However, he was in earnest and so well has the movement grown that at a meeting of the Tri State Good Roads Association held in San Francisco the other day the move was endorsed and the government is to be asked for a \$50,000,000 appropriation.

The road proposition has been before the local Chamber of Commerce and has been endorsed by them. The road would come through Coos Bay and on down the coast. It is said \$6,000,000 would be needed to carry it through Oregon.

Was Carrying Military Men According to Reports Which Have Been Received at Laredo

LAREDO, Sept. 17.—The wreck of a Mexican military train, resulting in the death of 90 persons, occurred Wednesday afternoon a mile out of Sattillo, according to advices here today.

ITALIAN SOLDIERS ARE RELIGIOUS

Sing While in Battle and Pray for Their Dead Left on Field

It is believed in Italy that King Victor's troops are the gayest and most light hearted in all the war, for they always go into battle singing. Their first thought on returning from a struggle, however, is a mass for the repose of the souls of comrades whom they had had to leave behind on the field. The most popular song in the camps, after the devout services are over, is "Addio Mia Bella" (Good-bye, My Love).

The religious enthusiasm in the army is also reflected in the fact that so many of the Roman Catholic clergy have rallied around the flag. The military authorities have expressed themselves as greatly pleased over this, for some of them had entertained the doubt that the clergymen were staunch patriots, but they have proved that they are ready to give their lives as willing for their as any other class of citizens.
