REPORTS OF HIGH CHARGES ON SCHOOL TEXTS AROUSE MUCH INDIGNATION—PROPOSE TO ELIMINATE TROUBLE IN FUTURE

Plans for eliminating the alleged high charges on public school books and for better service in supplementary books in the future are under consideration by a number interested in the schools. There is an intense feeling over the reports of high charges and it is likely that something will be done about the matter. A. L. Barker, formerly principal of the Marshfield high school, advocated a plan of eliminating the delays caused by inadequate service of Norton & Hansen, who have enjoyed a monopoly of the business, and also to eliminate any chance for excessive charges. It is likely that this will be taken up again.
