SELL FAIR GROUND FOR LUMBER BILL

Another Move Made in Connection With Establishment of Big Plant in Douglas

Telling of the sale of the Roseburg fair grounds for the use of the Kendall lumber mill the Roseburg Review says:

Stockholders of the Roseburg Park and Fair Association, at a special meeting held at the Commercial Club rooms, voted to sell the fair grounds just east of the city for the special purpose of a mill site for the Kendall Lumber Corporation. The vote on the resolution introduced for this purpose, in shares of stock of the Fair Association, resulted as follows:

Present, voting yes 2291
Present, voting no 397
Absent and not voting 471

Total 3159
Adoption of such a resolution required a favorable vote of two-thirds of the entire stock of the Fair Association. On this basis the vote stood:

Total vote in favor ... 2291
Necessary two-thirds ... 2106

Not majority in favor ... 182
This majority of 185 in excess of the necessary two-thirds, all stock absent or not voting being recorded against the resolution. This meeting, like the special bonding election held last June, shows an overwhelming sentiment in favor of this big sawmill enterprise and a railroad to the National forest reserve on the North Umpqua River.

YAQUINA SEEKS JETTY

Want Work Taken Up Again Where Was Left Off Years Ago

Completion of the Yaquina Bay jetty project, which was interrupted years ago after \$300,000 of an \$1,000,000 appropriation had been expended, is urgently sought by the port commissioners of Newport and Toledo. A meeting was held at Newport a few nights ago which was attended by Representative Hawley and ex-Congressman Binger Herman, who in 1879 secured the first appropriation for the Yaquina project where there were three entrances to the harbor and but seven feet of water at low tide.

In 1879 was the first time the jetty system was tried on the Pacific Coast and it was following this example that the Columbia River and Coos Bay came into line.

Yaquina first asks that a thorough survey of the harbor be made.

OLD FRIGATE IS BURNED

Fighter in War of 1812 Passes to Ignoble Death on Mud Flats

Burned on a mud flat for her copper rivets was the ignoble end of one of the one time proudest ships of the United States, the frigate Independence that started her career in the war of 1812 against England. Many people from Coos Bay have seen the old ship that for so long was used at Mare Island as a receiving ship.

The craft was recently sold by the government for \$3,515.15. It was then towed to the final resting ground and cremation took place. The Independence was America's first flag ship and at one time carried 74 guns on three decks. She was dismantled after being brought to Mare Island.

Several old "landmarks" of the first navy of Uncle Sam have passed recently. There was the frigate Constellation. She laid her charred bones on the flats near Bellingham not eight weeks since and now probed the ruins for the copper. The same fate came to the Pensacola, flagship of Admiral Farragut at Mobile and now but very few of the old ships remain in existence. All of them have been out of practical use of a fighting nature since 1870.

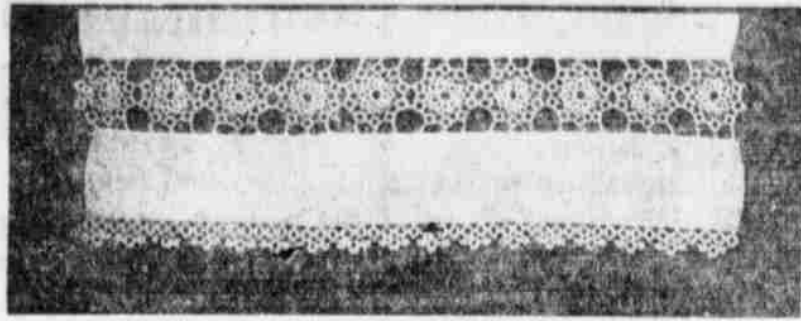

Tatting Towel.

A novel towel motif which brings into use the quaint art of tatting. Makes up very attractively.

Detail of medallion.

1st Row—Make ring 20 st. and 10 plects, close ring and fasten thread.

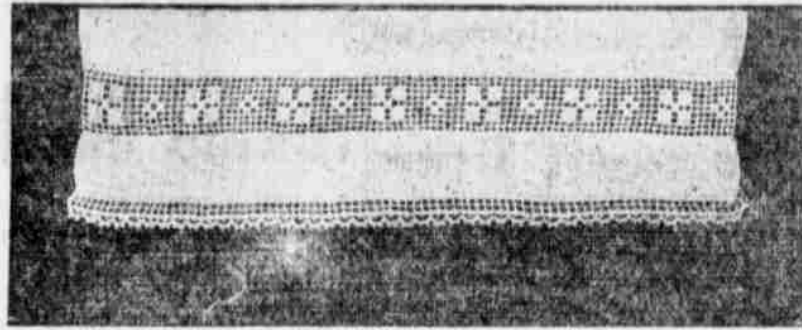
2nd Row—Make ring 2 st., 1 p., 2 st., fasten to p. of ring first made, 2 st., 1 p., 2 st., close ring and turn.

3rd Row—Make ring of 4 st., 1 p., 4 st., 1 p., 4 st., 1 p., 4 st., close ring and repeat from 2nd row.

Detail of Edging of Tatting Towel.

Make ring 4 st., 1 p., 4 st., 1 p., 4 st., close ring and fasten thread.

Turn, make ring like first and fasten to last p. made on first ring. Close ring and turn again. Make ring 3 st., fasten to last p. on small ring, 3 st., 1 p., 1 st., 1 p., 1 st., 1 p., 3 st., 1 p., 3 st., close ring and fasten thread—turn work—repeat 1 st. ring, turn. Make small ring, turn. Make 1 st. ring. This completes the first festoon—continue, always having 4 large rings on one side, 2 small and 1 large on the other. This pattern made of linen finish crochet thread is very handsome on scrim curtains.



Guest Towel—Detail of Fillet Insertion.

Towel designs are always appreciated and you will not be disappointed in the beauty of this one.

For the 3 open meshes make chain

of 27 sts. Always remember to ch. 5 at the end of row. In one filled mesh there are always 4 tr. In 2 there are 7, in 3 there are 10. Follow design.

Detail of Edge on Towel.

Fill end with dc., ch. 5, turn

2nd Row—Make row of open meshes with 2 chains between each treble.

3rd Row—Same as second row.

4th Row—4 dc. in 1st open mesh, 1 p., 4 dc. in next space, 4 dc. in next space, 1 p., repeat to end of row, always making 1 p. over every other tr.

5th Row—Ch. 5, and sl. st. into treble missed in 4th row. Notice the chain of 5 forms an over pivot made in preceding row. Repeat to end of work, turn.

6th Row—4 dc. in ch. of 5, 1 p., 4 dc., 1 p., 4 dc. repeat to end of work. This edge can be used on dresser scarfs, or can be made by making chain desired length, fill ch. with dc. and proceed from 1st row.

Like his uncle, he has begun his military career with the Royal Engineers. He has just completed a course of hard training in the north of England and has gone to earn his spurs in France.

TURKS WILL STUDY THE GERMAN WAY

Former Head of Sultan's Cabinet Commissioned by Government to Make Tour

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.—Mehmed Sâi Bey, former head of the Sultan's Chancery cabinet, professor of occidental literature and history at the University of Constantinople and well-known as a poet, has been commissioned by the Turkish government to make an extended trip through Germany to study the spiritual, artistic, economical and social life of the empire.

In his quest he will visit all the principal German cities and devote particular attention to German culture. His trip will have, however, no political significance, for he will not concern himself with questions of the day. His impressions will be recorded both orally and in book form on his return, through the Turkish Ministry of Education.

NEW RECORD MADE

Ascent of the Matterhorn Made in Fast Time
