George Jones Noah, born on South Coos River, Oregon, April 16, 1884, died at Marshfield, Oregon, September 20th, 1915. Age 31 years, 5 months, 10 days. He was the youngest son of the late John W. and Mary M. Noah. He was married in January, 1910, to Miss Emma Devoe, and they have three sons, Kenneth, Harold and Leonard. Besides his wife and children, he leaves six sisters and five brothers to mourn his untimely death. They are Silas Noah, Ed Noah, Fred Noah, Mrs. S. A. Yonkam, of Coos River; Mrs. Dave Mussen, Mrs. Walter Condron, Mrs. Chas. Kronholm, of Marshfield; Mrs. Mary Martin, Vancouver, B. C.; Mrs. Louisa Summers, Prescott, Arizona; Mr. Lorenzo Noah, La Grande, Oregon; Stora Noah, Butte, Montana. Of these, ten were present at the funeral. Two brothers and one sister have preceded him to the Great Beyond, one brother dying only three months ago.

Interment took place at Marshfield Thursday, September 23, on the 8th anniversary of his mother's funeral.

RUSSIAN COLONEL TURNS OUT TRAITOR

Is Executed for his Part in Plot to Betray Military Secrets to the Enemy

PETROGRAD, Sept. 24.—Colonel Masoyedoff, who has just been executed for his part in a plot to betray military secrets to the enemy, was an officer of the gendarmes and prominently connected with the famous secret police. He had been a close friend of General Sukhomlinoff, who recommended him highly to the government for use as a confidential agent. The retirement of General Sukhomlinoff was mainly due to his connection with the traitor.

All the men associated with Colonel Masoyedoff, according to the Petrograd newspapers, occupied at one time or another responsible posts in the secret police.

GATHER BEECH NUTS FOR MAKING OILS

School Children Gather Nuts Which Are Substituted for Imported Article

ESSEN, Germany, Sept. 24.—The school authorities of Westphalia have notified the school children of the district that they can perform a patriotic duty during vacation time by collecting beech nuts, from which it is possible to extract a table oil that is said to be a good substitute for the foreign oils, particularly Italian, that always have been imported. There still exist in the province establishments for extracting the oil from the nuts, for earlier there was a considerable industry in this line in Westphalia. The authorities of the seventh army corps are so impressed with the suggestion of the school authorities that they are furthering the proposition as far as possible.

EUGENE MAN IS KILLED

Casper Vaughan Meets Death While Working for Porter Brothers on the Railroad

Casper Vaughan, aged 23 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Vaughan, residing at 1158 Van Buren street, in Eugene, was instantly killed near Reedport, on the line of the Willamette Pacific Railway, near Gardiner, Monday, when the rope on a pile driver spool caught him and pulled him beneath the shaft. The remains were taken to Eugene for interment.

The unfortunate young man was employed by Porter Bros., railroad contractors. He was working with a crew on a bridge over the south fork of Smith River, and was engaged as spool tender on the pile driver. He was guiding the rope on the spool when he was caught in some manner not explained and suddenly jerked beneath the shaft, death resulting instantly. Besides his parents, the young man leaves three brothers and one sister, as follows: Billy Vaughan, of Wallace, Idaho; P. B. Vaughan, Peter Vaughan, and Mrs. Grace Bowers, all of Eugene. He also leaves several half brothers and sisters.

He was a member of Eugene lodge No. 656, Loyal Order of Moose.
