MAILS LATE AGAIN

TRAIN SCHEDULE DELAYS DELIVERY HERE 23 HOURS

Arrangements Into Effect Tomorrow—Caused by the Taking Off of One Train Daily

Starting tomorrow mail from the outside will arrive in Marshfield 23 hours later than it has been heretofore, on account of the change in the Southern Pacific train schedule as announced yesterday by Supt. W. F. Miller. Outgoing mail will also close four hours earlier than it has been closing.

Up to today the mail has, during the good weather months, been leaving Roseburg early in the morning, arriving in Myrtle Point that afternoon in time to catch the train that reached here at 5:30 p. m. This gave a distribution of the mail at night which was a benefit to those having boxes and also to a limited number who would call at the window before closing time at 7 p. m.

But all of this is done away with now. Under the new schedule the mail will leave Roseburg the same time in the morning, and arrive at Myrtle Point that afternoon but not in time to catch the afternoon train which will come through about three quarters of an hour earlier, according to the post office authorities. Inasmuch as there is no train through from Myrtle Point until late the next afternoon there can be no mail before that time under the present arrangement it was said this morning at the post office.

On Winter Schedule Under the winter schedule mail, when the roads are bad, would reach Myrtle Point anyway in the evening of the day it left Roseburg which would naturally mean a wait over for the train the next day. But last winter the train came to Marshfield several hours earlier than it will under the new schedule, all of which allowed for the distribution and delivery of the mail the second day out of Roseburg.

Mail from Coquille, Bandon and Delmar will close at 6:30 a. m. and for Powers, Myrtle Point and the outside, at 9:45 a. m.

Every woman always has a wealth of ribbon odds and ends and usually the great problem is finding a place to put them. This dainty and useful ribbon holder is the solution. Will make an ideal gift.

1st Row—Use ring 1/4 inch in diameter, 60 dc. into ring. Ch. 3, 2 t. in 2 dc, ch. 3, sk. 3 dc., 3 t. in next 3 dc., repeat around ring.

2nd Row—Ch. 3, 1 t. in center of 2 t. in 1st row. Ch. 3, 3 t. in first space, ch. 3, 1 t. in center of 3 t. repeat around ring.

3rd Row—Same as 2nd row.

4th Row—Ch. 3, 1 t., ch. 3, 3 t. in 1st space. Ch. 3, 1 t. in center of 3 t., ch. 3, 1 t. in center of 3 t., ch. 3, 3 t. in space. Repeat around ring.

5th Row—Make row of double treble with 5 ch. between.

6th Row—1 dc. in 3 ch. 5 t. in same ch. 1 dc.

7th Row—Ch. 3, p. in 1st t. of scallop, 6 p. to each scallop.

Run 1 inch in spaces made by double treble, loop at top to hang by. Put the narrow ribbon through the ring. This makes a very neat little gift.
