To Meet Tonight.—There was a meeting of the Elks building committee last evening and another slated for tonight and it is expected that this will lead to a fairly clear understanding as to what will be done in regard to building and on what location.

Sweep Up Paving.—It was noticeable this morning that the street sweepers were gathering up a good share of the paving on Front street that has been broken away by the use of the railroad track. Layers have been peeled off in some spots for many feet. The logging trucks, yesterday and today were running at a greatly reduced speed, seeking to keep down to the five miles an hour as agreed on in the last council meeting.

Ducks Are Plentiful.—Prospective hunters have already been out taking an early season census of the ducks. It is said that there were many in the vicinity of Ten Mile lake in the fore part of the week and big flights of teal, mallards and sprigs have been reported though it is a little early for many of the canvas backs. The hunters are now hoping for good rains that will effectively stop the flights that might otherwise pass over.
