**WANT A RESERVOIR**

**NORTH BEND NEEDS ONE HOLDING 250,000 GALLONS**

Recent Fire Awakens The Necessity —To Pay for Use of Marshfield Fire Truck

Fire in North Bend has awakened the city council to the necessity of an increased water reserve in case of a great conflagration. Increase of the present reserve tank of about 5,000 gallons to at least a quarter of a million gallons was under discussion by the council there last evening and a committee authorized to discuss the matter with the Coos Bay Water company. It was believed this move would prove cheaper than the purchasing of an auto truck for about \$9,000 and which would require a paid engineer.

**Appreciate Local Help**  
Appreciation for Marshfield's sending the local truck in the time of need last Saturday night was expressed and the council further asked the fire, light and water committee to ascertain the costs and draw a warrant for the Marshfield General fund.

The council stated the belief that inasmuch as Marshfield has purchased the truck and must pay its upkeep and two engineers there should be some payment made for services.

**Must Cut Expenses**  
Now that the time draws near for the cutting off of the saloons and the license money the city councilmen, like those of Marshfield, are scratching their heads and wondering what shall be done to curtail expenses. It was said last evening that at least \$1,000 will be lost to the city in revenues and at the next meeting the matter will be fully discussed. The six saloon licenses were renewed last night up to January 1.

**Will Cut Down**  
As one of the first means of cutting down expenses Councilmen Hollister, Loggie and Curtis were appointed a committee to confer with the Oregon Power Company about cutting out strings of lights on Sherman, Virginia and Washington streets.

Lighting service on the streets has been inefficient, said the councilmen, and this matter too is under discussion.

**Police Not Sweepers**  
Chief of Police Pete Anderson, in no mean terms, confided to the city fathers that he is not a "livery stable sweeper" and that though it has been hinted several times he should sweep Sherman avenue, he does not propose to do so, at least until an ordinance to this effect has been passed.

**Other Business**  
Sidewalks on Virginia hereafter must be at least 14 feet in width, is the gist of the new ordinance.

Acceptance was made of the sewer work completed by Edward Sandberg, of Portland. This project amounted to \$18,961.10 and a warrant for this amount was ordered drawn.

A claim of Baxter Robinson that he should receive the same wages as Archie Phillips for street work was laid on the table.

**DEEDS ARE FILED**  
OWNERSHIP OF DAVIS HEIRS IN LOCAL LAND SETTLED

Receive 112 Lots in New Bedford Addition and Twelve in Perham Park—Case Long at Issue

Deeds were being recorded at the County Clerk's office today settling the ownership of the Davis heirs in Perham Park, New Bedford Addition and a part of the Clement Plat. Frank Thomas, as agent of the A. J. Davis heirs, arrived here Saturday to make the final settlement of the land, the deeds of which have long been held in escrow.

The case is one that is long involved. Wilkins Warwick was the original patentee to the land in the Northwestern part of the city and which includes Wireless Hill, and he in turn sold out to A. J. Davis. The latter disposed of a half interest to a third party.

It was for many years that the Southern Oregon Company claimed the property under quit claim deeds received from Warwick and held that the original deed transferring the land from Warwick to Davis to be insufficient. The company then began suit against the Davis heirs to quiet title and by the settlement the heirs receive 112 lots in the New Bedford Addition and twelve more in Perham Park.

**Back Taxes Paid**  
Back taxes to the amount of \$2,416.84 have been paid into the city treasury by Mr. Thomas, and there still remains to be paid \$180.06 but this is said to be still in dispute and probably will be settled up in a few days.

**C. W. ANDERSON FINALLY GETS HERE TO LOCATE**

Has Been Intending to Come Here for Past Sixteen Years but Was Detained

After trying to locate on Coos Bay for the past sixteen years, C. W. Anderson has finally come here to reside and is taking up a homestead on Haynes Inlet and is going to stay here. Mr. Anderson was originally from Swazey, Ind., and he has a number of bachelor friends there who have asked him to report on Coos Bay and if he likes it here they will come out and also settle on land.

Mr. Anderson says that he and some others started for Coos Bay sixteen years ago. They came to the coast, but met with some misfortune at Los Angeles which prevented their coming this far. Again he started to come to Coos Bay and was caught in the San Francisco fire and never got here. He has been on the coast all this time and always intended to come here. Once he was on the Coos Bay Wagon road and got about half way here from Roseburg. He visited for a short time not many miles out from Coos Bay and while there got a letter to come to another part of the state and went in response to that call.

Mr. Anderson has finally gotten here, however, and says that he likes the country and is here to stay. He says that he was told it would be very difficult for him to secure a homestead here, but says he finds that there is more desirable land on which to locate than many people suppose. He has sent back copies of the Coos Bay Times to a number of his Eastern friends.
