HALF OF COUNCIL SAYS SO—OTHER HALF DISAGREES

Friends of Band Intending to Ask \$99.99 Gift Each Council Meeting to End of the Year

Every Council night until the end of the year friends of the Coos Bay Concert Band are expected in the Council chambers asking for a gift of \$99.99. This was their statement this morning and furthermore, Mayor Allen says that he believes in the band and will continue to cast the deciding vote in favor of such appropriations.

He stated this morning that the people voted for the ordinance and for this reason he considers it in effect until at least the coming election, when they will again vote on the matter. Should the vote then prove favorable, there will be coming to the band through 1916 monthly installments of \$150 and the organization will be effectively lived again.

Money amounting to \$99.99 allowed by the Coos Bay Concert Band at the meeting of the Council on Monday evening was regarded by three city fathers as a gift, clearing up all amounts that might be said as still coming to the band. The other three members and the Mayor favor further appropriations.

Many times in the past few days has the question been asked as to whether or not the band, or citizens on behalf of the band, can come into future Council meetings and ask for further installments, claiming them to be due for the past four months that the band appropriation has been cut off.

The fact is pointed out that an ordinance must be drawn to appropriate any sum for more than \$100. This is why the proposition was put up at \$99.99. No ordinance was needed, the Councilmen were known to be three to three on the measure, and it simply left the decision in the hands of Mayor Allen.

Must be Gift John D. Goss, City Attorney, that evening gave the opinion that the \$99.99 would have to be an out and out gift, and not at all for any month or portion of a month. He said that to make it for part of a month or payment in full for any month would in itself be an act to defeat the city ordinance.

SEEK UMPQUA ROAD

GARDINER TO ASK COOS BAY TO BUILD HIGHWAY NORTH

Claim It Logical Outlet to Pacific Highway—Committee Coming To Big Convention

The Umpqua route as the logical road outlet from Coos Bay to the Pacific Highway is urged by the Commercial Club of Gardiner and at a meeting on Tuesday night a committee was appointed to appear before the Coos Bay Good Roads Association at their meeting in North Bend October 7 to further advocate the measure. Already the Douglas county court has agreed on a highway from Winchester Bay to Reedsport next year, say the members, and the road is going to be extended on through to Scottsburg to connect with the Drain outlet.

Good roads enthusiasm is uncorked to the limit in Gardiner and all along the Umpqua, according to J. E. Montgomery who attended the meeting this week. He said the men behind the move have the financial backing and are determined to get what they are after. The committee coming to North Bend consists of Warren Reed, J. H. Austin and Dr. R. H. Fields.

Workmen now are completing a road from Winchester Bay around the bluff to the ocean beach. This work, amounting to about \$2,800 is being paid for by the Douglas county court. Heretofore there has been no roadway to the beach and at high tide it was impossible to get to the ocean except by crawling up over the bluff.

Mill Starts Again The Gardiner Lumber Mill has started up again, said Mr. Montgomery, after being shut down for several days on account of having no logs on hand.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30.—Great preparations are being made for the Conference on National Defense, which will be held in Washington, October 4-7 immediately following the Grand Army of the Republic Encampment. The Conference on defense, to be held under the auspices of the National Defense League, and in which the Navy League, National Rifle Association, and affiliated defense organization will participate, promises to be as large a gathering as the G. A. R. encampment. Thousands of the Grand Army veterans have written to the National Defense League that they will remain in Washington after the encampment to attend the Conference on National Defense.

COUNTY COURT TURNS DOWN \$207 CLAIM FOR DETECTIVES

Do Not Believe in "Gum-shoers"—Sheriff Asks Salary for Britt Anderson

Bills amounting to \$207 for detective hire, sent to the county court by Sheriff Alfred Johnson have been turned down. This included proposed salary to Britt Henderson for discharging evidence in the old Empire saloon robbery case. Henderson is now behind the bars in the Coquille jail on the charge of breaking his parole. He was arrested some weeks ago and in a Front street saloon flourished a gun and now is waiting for his case to come before Judge Coke.

District Attorney Liljeqvist says that he knew nothing about the hiring of Henderson until some time after he had been out on the job and that he in no way countenanced putting on as a detective, a man who had been convicted of a crime and whose evidence and testimony could be impeached on the slightest provocation in the court room.

Who Will Pay Salary Who will pay Britt Henderson's salary now is not known. The fact that the county court refuses the bill throws the burden either upon the sheriff or Henderson.

Henderson went down to Empire and scouted about through the woods scraping together bits of evidence for future arrests. None have been made and the grand jury was dismissed without making any indictments in the case and the belief is expressed that it will be impossible to dig up reliable evidence. Ruby Morrison is also said to have been a proposed source of information.

Knew Nothing of It Mr. Liljeqvist said this morning that he did not know anything about Henderson being hired to secure evidence in the robbing houses of North Bend or any other part of the county.

The crime of which Henderson was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for and later paroled was that of cashing a no-fund check.

FROM BURNED CITY

EUGENE CROSTHWAITE LONG A RESIDENT OF OKLAHOMA Eugene Crosthwaite, of The Smokehouse, was intensely interested in the story of the burning of the heart of Ardmore, Oklahoma, in the gasoline and dynamite explosion. He resided in Ardmore for a number of years before coming to Coos Bay.

Mr. and Mrs. Crosthwaite were married at Ardmore, where her father was a minister for a number of years. Now neither of them have any relatives in the town, but have many friends there.

Mr. Crosthwaite says that Ardmore has a population of about 12,000 and at one time was the largest primary cotton market in the world, cotton being hauled there on wagons from fifty and sixty miles. One year over 100,000 bales of cotton were hauled in there on wagons.

The town consists principally of one business street, extending for over half a mile parallel with the railroad track. Mr. Crosthwaite says that the principal part of the destroyed section was formerly occupied by gambling houses, etc.

Mr. Crosthwaite when there was connected with the Dawes Indian Commission, which was settling up tribal affairs in Oklahoma. Yesterday was the seventh anniversary of the arrival of Mr. Crosthwaite in Coos Bay.
