LOSS BIG AT NEW ORLEANS

Property Damage in City and Vicinity is Estimated at Several Millions
OVER 60 ARE DEAD
Fear Felt for Safety of the People Living on Lower Mississippi River
LEVEES ARE GIVING AWAY
Many Houses are Reported to Have Been Swept Away—Believed That Many Lives May Have Been Lost in Louisiana

DEATH LIST MAY REACH 60 OR MORE
[By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.]
BATON ROUGE, Oct. 1.—The death list of the hurricane is now expected to reach 65 or 70. Property damage reaches millions. The losses as far as known are as follows:
New Orleans—19 dead, 100 injured; property loss, \$2,000,000.
Mississippi Coast—13 dead, score injured or missing, loss \$2,000,000.
Frenier, La.—25 dead, score injured, heavy damage.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 1.—[By courier to Baton Rouge.]—Nineteen known dead, probably 200 injured and damage to buildings, wire circuits, railroads, shipping and other property in New Orleans and vicinity estimated at several million dollars, was the toll exacted by the hurricane which swept the city Wednesday.
Worst Ever Known
It was the worst ever experienced in this section. Of the known dead ten are whites and nine negroes. Fear is felt for residents along the Mississippi River south of here. The last report said the water was flowing over the levees and many homes were swept away.
