ALLIES ATTACK GERMAN LINES

Attempts Being Made to Break Through Continue on the Western Battle Front

LOSES ARE HEAVY

British Try to Retake Ground Lost, but Are Repulsed, According to Berlin

STILL FIGHTING IN RUSSIA

Austro-German Forces Continue to Keep Up Their Violent Campaign Against Czar's Troops Regardless of Western Results

TURKS REPORT BRITISH REPULSED

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 2.—Announcement was made by the War Office today that the British forces in Mesopotamia were repulsed in recent fighting.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Allies continued their attempts to break through the German lines on the western front yesterday and last night. An attempt by British to retake ground north of Loos was defeated with heavy losses, Berlin reports. Several French attacks were also repulsed and a number of prisoners taken.

French Reports

Paris says that perceptible progress was made from trench to trench on the La Folie heights. East of Mavarin farm in Champagne the French conquered an important section of German positions which constituted a salient of the line north of Meunil.

Fight in Russia

Germans continue an offensive vigorously in Russia. The situation on the eastern front is still regarded in London as of the greatest immediate importance, notwithstanding new offensive in the west. To transfer the center of gravity of the war to the western front is the task now before the French and British.

ARMENIANS TO HAVE FREE TRANSPORTATION

Conditions Are That They Actually Become American Citizens on Their Arrival Here

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 2.—Turkey has consented to the emigration of all Armenians who actually will become naturalized American citizens on their arrival in this country. Ambassador Morgenthau at Constantinople arranged with the Turkish government for the free departure of all such Armenians.

AUSTRALIA HAS LOST MANY MEN

Total Over Thirteen Thousand Have Been Sacrificed for England in Great War

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 1.—The number of casualties among the 76,000 men that Australia has sent to war was made known by Premier Fisher in a statement to Parliament. The losses, including the men who died in Egypt and en route since the embarkation of the first contingent in November, 1914, now total some 13,976, he said, of which he gave the following classification:

Total 640 13,336 13,976. The Premier stated that 40,000 troops were now in preparation for the front, and that by early winter the Australian Expeditionary Forces, not counting losses, would have reached a total of 117,000.

WANTS FREE PASSAGE FOR MUNITIONS

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A telegram from Amsterdam says that Austria is about to send an ultimatum to Rumania demanding the free passage of munitions to Turkey.

LEADS IN PRAYER

PRESIDENT WILSON ASKS CABINET TO JOIN HIM

Incident Is Told by Bishop Anderson At Session of the Indiana Methodist Episcopal Church

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 2.—How President Wilson led the Cabinet in prayer at a recent meeting was told here by Bishop Anderson of Cincinnati at the session of the Indiana Methodist Episcopal conference. A United States senator told the bishop of the incident, he said. The senator heard it from one of the cabinet members who prayed with the president.

Wore Solemn Look

"When the president arrived at the Cabinet meeting," said the Bishop, "His face wore a solemn look. It was evident that serious affairs of the nation were on his mind. He said to the Cabinet members, 'I don't know whether you men believe in prayer or not. I do. Let us pray and ask help of God.'"

Fell on His Knees

And right there the president of the United States fell upon his knees and the rest of the members of the cabinet did the same and the president offered a prayer to God.

"While war rages in Europe, we in this country should thank God that in this crisis of the world we have a chief executive who is a servant of God and who stands with his hand in the hand of God.

Should Pray for Him

"Every minister in the land should every time he offers prayer, take Woodrow Wilson by the hand and lead him into the presence of God, and ask that he be given strength to continue to be the great apostle of peace among men."

Later a telegram expressing the confidence of the delegates in him, was sent to the President.

MAY CHANGE POLICY

U. S. MONEY MAY BUILD MORE SHIPS THAN PLANNED

Report that England Destroyed Many Submarines Puts Different Light on Subject

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 2.—Confidential reports to the United States government that England has destroyed 50 to 70 German submarines will broadly affect the American naval policy in the coming year. The new naval bill will call for addition of dreadnoughts instead of building submarines on such extensive scale as described by many.

ARRESTED AS SPY

DR. F. A. COOK, EXPLORER, DETAINED IN INDIA

Motion Picture Machine He Had With Him Is Confiscated by The Authorities

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 2.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, explorer, was arrested as a German spy by the authorities at Rangoon, India, and his motion picture outfit was confiscated, according to Curtis W. Allen, an American who told today of his own imprisonment as a spy seven times during 11 months in India.

He said he went abroad last year to buy timber. He was born in Anacortes, Washington, where his parents live. Cook ultimately left Rangoon for the interior.

MOVING TOWARD SERBIAN FRONT

Bulgarian Army Starts Offensive Movement According to Reports Received at Paris

ARTILLERY MASSES

Concentrated Along Frontier of Portion of Rumania That Was Lost in 1878

MEN UP TO 58 ARE CALLED

No Male Subjects Under 45 Years of Age Allowed to Leave the Country—One Army is Being Sent Forward to Greek Border

MILAN, Italy, Oct. 2.—Bulgaria is mobilizing all men up to the age of 38 years, according to a Bucharest correspondent. No citizen under 45 is permitted to leave the country and martial law has been proclaimed.

Pro-German manifestations are reported in Bulgarian cities along the Danube. The Bulgarian artillery is being massed along the frontier of Dobruja, a part of Rumania bounded by the Black Sea and the Danube, which was taken from Bulgaria in 1878 and given to Rumania.

MOVE TOWARD FRONTIER

Bulgaria Directs Movement Toward the Serbian Frontier

PARIS, Oct. 2.—It is reported from Athens that the Bulgarian troops from Sofia, are moving in the direction of the Serbian frontier and other forces are being dispatched toward the Greek border. It is believed the principal point of concentration will be along the upper Stouma River near the Siberian border.

JEW'S CONTRIBUTE

DECIDE TO SUBSCRIBE TO ANGL-FRENCH LOAN

Action Due to Assurance that Russia is Not to Participate in The Deal

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Syndicate underwriting the Anglo-French loan was cheered by the support given them by Jewish clients. Definite announcement by the Anglo-French commission that Russia would not be participant in the loan is believed to have entered to a large extent into the decision of the Jews to subscribe.

BREAKWATER IS OFF

Due Next Week and Thence South to Tie Up — Captain Macgenn Veteran Skipper

Officially the steamship Breakwater is off the Coos Bay-Portland run. She will come here from Portland next week with a cargo of rails and sail for San Francisco, there to be tied up indefinitely. This is the word announced this morning from the S. P. offices.

U. S. inspectors examined the Breakwater. They said she would have to receive repairs to the amount of approximately \$50,000. This was too much, the S. P. decided, hence the veteran craft is put in retirement. It is possible she will later be repaired.

YALE IS DEFEATED

UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA WINS IN BRILLIANT GAME

Princeton, Pennsylvania, Georgetown and Harvard Are Also Victorious in the Contests

Officers of Mine and Miners Hold Meeting—Details Will Be Given Out Tonight

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 2.—The Rockefeller industrial plan approved by a unanimous vote at a meeting of mine officers and miners here today. The details will not be made public until tonight. John D. Rockefeller Jr. addressed the meeting.

The plan will be submitted to the Board of Directors of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company and to a referendum vote of the miners at all camps for final adoption.

Will Remember Day

In opening his address Rockefeller said: This is the red letter day of my life. This is the first time I ever had an opportunity to speak to delegates of the miners and officers of the company together. This is a day I shall remember until I die."

TWO YOUTHS TELL OF TAKING BICYCLES FROM STREETS

Henry Lloyd and Leo Wiggins Arrested—Before Juvenile Court on Monday

Henry Lloyd, aged 15 years, and Leo Wiggins, about the same age, were arrested this morning and charged with the theft of three bicycles from the streets of Marshfield. TOTAL DEATHS IN STORM 350

Estimates of Casualties Today Greatly Increases Reports Which Were Received

LOSS IS \$12,000,000

150 Schooners are Ashore Between Gulfport and New Orleans

MANY ARE TOTAL WRECK

Others Are Stranded Above the High Water Line and Some of the Vessels Are Seen to Have Been Thrown Far Inland

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 2.—It is estimated today that the total dead in the Gulf coast storm would number at least 350. The known death list already stands at 224. In addition there are 117 known missing. The damage is roughly estimated at \$12,000,000.

More than 150 schooners are observed ashore between Gulfport and New Orleans, many total wrecks. Others are intact, but as high as 15 feet above the high tide levee. Others are far inland.

KILLED IN WRECK

ONE OF S. P. TRAIN CREW DEAD AND TWO HURT

Passengers Escape Injury When Part of Northbound Train Goes Over An Embankment

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 2.—One of the train crew was killed and two injured this morning when the Southern Pacific passenger train "Lark" northbound, was wrecked near San Luis Obispo. The locomotive, mail car and dynamo car tumbled down an embankment. No passengers were injured.

TRANSFER GENERAL

NAFARRATE IS TO BE REMOVED FROM BORDER

American Officers Think Step Will Help Some in Restoring Peace at Boundary

BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 2.—The transfer of General Nafarrate, the Carranza Commander at Matamoras, from the border is announced by Nafarrate himself today. American officers consider transfer highly important in helping to restore peace on the international boundary. General Eugenio Lopez, now near Torreon, will succeed him.
