# ARRANGE SCHEDULE

## HIGH SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVES MEET IN COQUILLE

### To Fix Dates for Football, Basket Ball, Debate and Oratory for the Year

Representatives of the five county schools today are meeting in Coquille to decide the football, basket ball, debate and oratory schedule for the year. Supt. Tiedgen, Prof. Barzeit and Will McDonald left this morning to take part in the meeting.  
Football games with the schools of the Valley are still undecided, said Supt. Tiedgen. He said that if possible a schedule would be made out including them, though first the opinion of the other schools would have to be received. The expense of taking teams back and forth has hitherto made these games almost prohibitive.  
It is expected that a basket ball schedule about the same as the one of last winter will again be adopted. This league was an entire success and allowed for all the teams in the League to meet the others. There were in addition to these many outside games with independent fives.  
Much interest is being evidenced in the debate this year and at least a dozen "spouters" are trying for the team. All of the members of last year's team are back in school this year. Bandon took the championship of the county from Marshfield last season by one point.

Local engineers have estimated the cost of the road through this county towards a million dollars. Will the state give half of this amount for the road?  
No Sir; nor one tenth. If not how is a trunk line possible by this route to Roseburg? And under no circumstances is the road possible without the co-operation of Douglas county. And even if Douglas county desired to build a road in this direction is it practicable or possible for her to do so?  
Can any of the Myrtle Point route advocates show anything from authoritative source that Douglas county will meet Coos with a trunk line out in middle forks canyon? It is well to bear in mind that Coos County wants to get out, and cannot coerce Douglas to meet anywhere against her own interest.  
Douglas county wants to get to the sea shore which she can do by building through her own country a road for her to do so.  
Consequently Douglas county has no particular object in building an expensive road to the middle forks canyon. That is the way the members at the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce expressed it two years ago. The Roseburg press stated it was either built down the Umpqua or meet a fight for county division.  
Judge Rice of the Douglas county court is on record as favoring the Umpqua road. Last spring the Gardner Chamber of Commerce adopted resolutions urging action on the Umpqua road and appointed a committee to take the matter up with the county court.  
Has any Chamber of Commerce outside of southern Coos adopted resolutions urging Douglas county to take action on the canyon road? Douglas county, like Coos, can do no extensive road building without bonding or levying a special tax. A majority vote of the tax payers is required in either case.  
With the railroad developing and increasing the population of North-Western Douglas county, creating a more pressing demand for the Umpqua road, and Douglas county pledged to build the road, and the county judge on record as favoring the road, there is the majority who, at the risk of precipitating a county division fight, will authorize a road out to the middle forks canyon?  
Gentlemen who advocate the Myrtle Point road, the Times readers will want to hear both sides.  
It is up to you to refute the above. Silence will do no good.
