#### COOS COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION HOLDS MEETING

Discuss Regulations for Debating, Oratorical and Athletic Contests for the Coming Year

Superintendent E. L. Coe of North Bend was elected president of the Coos County High School Association which was held at Coquille this week. Representatives were present from five four year high schools of the county. Arrangements and rules for the debating, oratorical and athletic contests.

**Debating Contests**  
In judging the Coos county debates this year, argumentation will count 50 per cent, delivery and rebuttal, 25 per cent each. A resolution was forwarded to the president of the state league favoring this change in the state judges' card.

Any two schools winning both of their debates will debate for county championship regardless of points, each school furnishing one team. The point system in use last year will be used again for the first round of debates. The first debates will be January 28th. The negative team will represent its team away from home.

Marshfield goes to Myrtle Point; North Bend to Bandon; Myrtle Point to Coquille; Bandon to Marshfield; Coquille to North Bend.

**Oratorical Contests**

The following rules were made for oratorical and declamation contests: By vote the oratorical and declamatory cups shall become the property of the school that first wins three victories.

By vote the method of judging will remain as in former years except that the superintendent of schools will be judge from each school.

A limit of 1500 words was placed on oratorical and declamatory selections, the actual number of words being certified to at the time the name of the selection is sent in to the manager.

The oratorical contest will be held at Marshfield this year on the second Friday in April.

Supt. C. A. Howard of Coquille was appointed to revise the constitution governing oratory and declamation by incorporating the numerous amendments that have been made.

By vote humorous selections and paraphernalia of any kind were barred from the contests.

**Athletic Events**

The track meet will be at Myrtle Point on May 20th. All athletic details remain as in former years.

Basket ball and foot ball schedules have been made out.

Supt. Turnbull of Bandon was appointed to secure a commencement speaker.

**Favor Round Table**

An organization to be known as the Coos County Round Table and composed of all the men in the Four Year High Schools, together with the county superintendent and county supervisor and a few others was favored. Superintendent Turnbull of Bandon was chosen temporary chairman with power to call the first meeting and to arrange a program. The expenses may be pooled and borne equally by all attending. The first meeting will probably be held in December.

**Want Lectures**

The possibility of securing lectures during the year came up for its annual discussion but nothing was done nor can be until the railroad is completed.

### MAY GO IN RESERVE

#### CURRY COUNTY CONSIDERS EXCLUDING THE HUNTERS

Action Would Deprive Sportsmen of One of the Finest Game Grounds in State

It appears possible that the forests of Curry county which have always been famous as hunting grounds may be thrown into the game preserve. If this is done one of the best hunting grounds in the state will be taken away from the sportsmen. Those who advocate the plan set forth that the county gains little from entertaining outside hunters who bring all their own ammunition and supplies and that local people would be allowed to hunt on their own ground.

**What Newspaper Says**

In discussing the plan the Por Oxford Tribune prints the following: "Forest Reserve officials are inquiring into the sentiment of the people of Curry county relative to the making of a game preserve out of the forest reserve lands within this county."

The question is one worthy of considerable thought before arriving at a conclusion.

"Curry is about the only county in the state where game is still plentiful. It is a big resource if handled properly, as proven by a number of other states, notably Wyoming and Maine. At the present time many hunting parties come here during the summer, buying their license in some other county and many bringing even their ammunition and provisions, and this county derives but little benefit."

**Would Not Be Lost**

"If a game reserve was made for 5 or 10 years it would affect our home people but little. Those having homesteads in the reserve could hunt on their own land. In the meantime the deer and scattering bands of elk would increase, and when the time was up, by following the example of some other states, and making the hunter buy a license in this county and hire a guide to go with him into the mountains, the people of Curry county would be deriving the benefit from this resource that they are entitled to."

"Think the matter over. It is a question that can be looked at from more than one angle."
