Auto Accident.—Harry McKeown and A. S. Hammond started for Coquille in the Hammond auto this afternoon but had a breakdown out about ten miles and had to return on a stage car.

Sues for Divorce.—Suit has been filed in the county clerk's office by Mrs. Guy C. Lattin for divorce from her husband. The couple reside at 603 Tenth street in this city and have been married for many years.

Visits City Jail.—John Messem yesterday paid a visit to the City Jail and liked it so well that he remained until he was in a sober mood. He then left, but without in any way replenishing the general fund.

Visiting Territory.—H. J. Freidman, circulation manager of the Oregon Voter, the Portland publication, is in the city in the interests of his paper. He has been visiting the Valley cities and from here will go to North Bend and will probably leave for Portland Friday.

Salmon Trolling Good.—J. J. Ott, of Allegany, says that the salmon trolling continues good on the north fork of Coos River and that many fishermen daily are getting good catches. He says the trout fishing is also good now for this time of the season.

To Play Baseball.—There has been a game scheduled between Beaver Hill and a picked nine from Coos Bay for Saturday afternoon at the ball park in North Bend. The Beaver Hill team ended the season in the Coos Bay league with a good showing through the season and it is expected they will put up a hard game with the picked nine.

Disapprove Good Weather.—Hunters are grouchy these days. They disapprove the good weather for the reason that the ducks are now flying over the bay on their way south and not even hesitating here. They say the rain must keep up if the hunting is to be bettered and each night they anxiously look for the weather reports.

Mail Late Again.—The mail failed to arrive at the office from Myrtle Point last evening and did not get here until the 9:38 train this morning. The papers were not sent over, but will come on the train tonight. The post office authorities do not know whether the morning delivery will be regular from now on through the winter or not. It will at least be in effect during the stormy weather.

Finds Water Low.—Because of the low water at the north fork of Coos River, the steamer Alert has been

unable to make its landing at Allegany for several nights, stopping quite a ways downstream. Captain Edwards said he would go all the way through tonight at high water in order to get the D. L. Foote auto which has been on the stage run, and then on the same tide drop back down the river again.

Expert Here.—Edward J. Swindells, sales manager of the Lutke Manufacturing Company of Portland arrived here yesterday to arrange for installing the fixtures in the Hub Clothing & Shoe Company's new store in the Irving block. Special fixtures, made and designed to give the greatest amount of show room in the floor space are to be arranged. Pupils in Benefit Recital.—There have been received here programs of the second annual recital of the pupils of Prof. A. Richards in Bandon on Monday evening. This was given for the benefit of the Public Library and was very well attended. Much commendation, it is said, is due Prof. Richards for the success of the recital and the cause for which it was held. It is expected that musical works will be added to the library with the funds thus raised.

Killed Big Deer.—According to a report here, Clarence Gould recently killed near Allegany one of the biggest deer ever killed in this section. It was a four pointer and is said to have weighed, after being partly dressed but with the hide, feet and head still on, 225 pounds.

Ferry Traffic.—Captain Alex Hall of the Ferry Transit reports that during September 5597 passengers, 118 double teams, 194 single rigs, 35 autos and 118 head of stock were conveyed between Marshfield and Eastside.

Relative Dying.—L. L. Thomas left on this morning's auto for Roseburg in response to a message from Mrs. Thomas that her father, S. C. Stuckey, was at the point of death. Mr. Stuckey is about 72 years old and was prominent at Stayton, where he formerly resided and is in the insurance business. He was in excellent health until a few weeks ago when he suffered an attack of heart trouble. Besides Mrs. Thomas, another daughter, Mrs. Jessen, formerly resided in Marshfield. A son is engaged in the newspaper business at Topeka, Kansas.

Movie Man Coming.—There remains but two pictures for the movie man, K. B. Westleder, of Bandon, to take yet in the 600 feet that belong to Marshfield. The remainder of the film then, some 400 feet, has been purchased by North Bend and will be used during the Bridge Carnival to take scenes there. A logging train and the Noble Theatre will be taken for the Marshfield pictures. Following the Carnival Mr. Westleder expects to have the entire 2,000 feet of film developed and arrangements will then be made to have this put onto a regular movie circuit.

L. R. STINSON DEAD

PROMINENT K. OF P. MAN COMITS SUICIDE TODAY

Had Been Grand Keeper of Records and Seals for Oregon Quarter of Century

Word was received today by friends here of the suicide of L. R. Stinson of Salem, the grand keeper of records and seals of the Knights of Pythias grand lodge of Oregon.

Mr. Stinson shot himself. It is said that the act was due to a breakdown from over work. At the K. of P. meeting at Crater Lake recently Mr. Stinson said to a Coos Bay friend that he had lost forty pounds and was suffering from a nervous trouble, but that he thought that he was on the mend and would be all right again soon.

Highly Popular

Probably no man in Oregon had more friends than Mr. Stinson. He had held the office of grand keeper of records and seals for the order for the past twenty-five years and devoted his entire time to that work.

Many Friends Here

He had visited many times on Coos Bay and had a host of friends and members of the order here. Mr. Stinson was about 51 years old. He was a bachelor and lived at Salem with his mother who survives him. In the order he was known as "Our Lew", an endearing name which the members gave him.

Last February, Mr. Stinson went to Washington to represent Oregon at the Golden Jubilee of the Knights of Pythias, and was known through out the country among the K. of P. members.

Meeting Next Week

The grand lodge was called to meet next week at Portland and local members say that it will more likely be a sorrowful gathering rather than one of pleasure.

Local members of the order say that Mr. Stinson was the backbone of the K. of P. in Oregon and that he is a man for whom it is scarcely possible to say too much in his praise.
