MUST MAKE PROFIT

UNLESS PRESENT ROAD IS PAYING, NO EXTENSION, IS WORD

C. J. Millis Tells of Heavy Expenditure on Willamette Pacific—No News on Coast Road

Back to his old friends and into Coos Bay for the first time in four years, C. J. Millis, assistant to President Sproule, of the S. P., and former manager of the Harriman interests in this section, has returned for a few days. He is accompanied by Mrs. Millis and tomorrow is scheduled to talk at the Bridge Carnival. Mr. Millis says that he comes representing the executive department of the Southern Pacific as President Sproule was unable to come.

It was in 1907 that Mr. Millis came here to take charge of the S. P. business and he remained here until 1911 when he was promoted to his present position. During that time he made a host of friends and now both he and Mrs. Millis are busy renewing old acquaintances. Mr. Millis was asked the same question that has pestered every S. P. official that has come to Coos Bay since the Willamette Pacific started building out from Eugene. "When will trains be in actual operation?"

Tells of Operations

He didn't side-step the question. He said that a few days ago Chief Engineer William Hood told him that in all probability the rails from the north and the south would meet at the Umpqua early in the winter and that early in the spring trains could be giving us service in and out. The Umpqua bridge cannot be finished in time, but plans have been made to either use false work or to ferry across the river.

Must Make Money.

Eight millions of dollars spent on the line in here, together with its equipment, must be first shown as a money-making road before it can be expected the S. P. will extend farther on, he stated. This money must pay \$400,000 annually. It means, for interest alone, 40,000 people at \$10 each, or 4,000 carloads of freight at \$100 a car. "Then," continued Mr. Millis "the question is, can Coos Bay do this and will she?"
