## AUTO STRIKES LAD

LEG OF 14 YEAR OLD ERMAN BRADSHAW BROKEN

Stepped in Front of Machine Last Evening in North Bend—Driver is Exonerated

Dodging from behind a confectionery booth on Sherman avenue in North Bend where he was playing tag last evening with some other youngsters, Erman Bradshaw stepped in front of an automobile and received a broken leg. The lad was immediately tended by Dr. Bartle.

The machine was driven by Mrs. Louis Anderson. She was in every way exonerated from any blame, witnesses declaring that at the time she was going very slowly and that the boy came dashing out from behind the booth without any warning and was not looking toward the machine.

It was said this morning that the youth, who comes from a large family, will be properly taken care of through his illness, either by Mrs. Anderson or the Carnival Committee. This is the first accident that has been reported through the carnival, though the streets have been crowded at all times. The boy is one of a family of eight children and the father is ill.

## KICK ON TAXES

CENTRAL AVENUE OWNERS OBJECT TO INCREASE

Advance of About Sixty Per cent on Property East of Fourth Street.

Central avenue property owners are incensed over a big increase in the assessment of the property along the thoroughfare east of Fourth street. The increase made by Assessor Thrift is said to have been about sixty per cent.

Some of the affected property owners say that they were not aware of the increase until after the first session of the Board of Equalization so that they did not have an opportunity to enter protest. They will now take it up with the County Clerk.

They claim that there were no other material increases made in assessments here, and that there is nothing to justify the big increase on this particular property.
