

the Coquille Valley Sentinel says: "In his complaint Mr. Farris avers hat he is an expert butcher and meat cutter by trade and as such eld a position in Miller's Sanitary Merket. Also that to injure hlm in is good name, fame and reputation and cause him to be held up to pub-'e scorn and contempt, the defendants named above did wilfully, wickedly and malevolently conspire to decelate false and defamatory stories derogatory to his character and repitation.

He charges that they went to Mr. Miller, his employer, accused him of being a tramp and said that he was secreting silverware to prevent it from being used in a grand jury inestimation. They even said he had stolen the silverware and that he had a suit case filled with it in his room, and was about to be arrested for the crime.

"Fariss also avers that they so persistently circulated the reports that he was a tramp and an undestrable citizen that he lost his sitvation and has been unable to secure nother.

"For the loss of employment he demands damages in the sum of \$75; and for the mental anguish he has suffered and the pain, humiliation and disgrace to which he has been subjected, and for his loss of association with good people he wants \$425 more, or a total of \$500. "It remains to add that when the Sheriff examined that sultcase which figures so prominently in this story he found a butcher knife and a package of envelopes."
