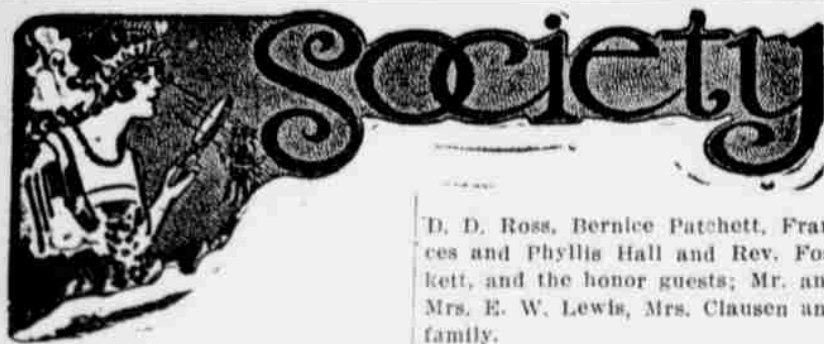

HIT NO MUD BANK

CAPTAIN LOFSTED DENIES SANTA CLARA WAS TROUBLED

Reported Delayed on Bank in San Francisco Bay—Arrives This Morning From the South
Arriving in this morning early from Eureka and San Francisco the steamship Santa Clara brought a good sized passenger list and about 760 tons of freight. She left out shortly after 11 o'clock for Portland.

Captain Lofsted laughed at the report that the Santa Clara had poked her nose onto a mud bank below Alcatraz Island on the trip into San Francisco Bay. The report from there was that the steamship hit the bank and was delayed there until the next tide before she could be floated.

ARRANGE NEW RATE

NORTH PACIFIC BOATS TO CARRY FREIGHT TO VALLEY

Breakwater Not Going On Run But Company Has Plan to Give Service Wanted

Advice received today from Southern Pacific headquarters, Portland, state that arrangements have been made with the north Pacific Steamship Co. to handle freight between Portland, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Bandon, Powers and other local points on the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railroad Co. through Marshfield in place of the Steamer "Breakwater."

Mr. Miller says the Breakwater will not return to the Portland-Marshfield run because she is seriously in need of repairs; the cost of which is extensive.

The arrangement with the Northern Pacific Steamship Co. is made through desire of the Southern Pacific Co. to continue through freight service for their patrons until such time as the Willamette Pacific line is completed and in operation, which is expected to be not later than May 1st of next year.

To Give Good Service

Under existing regulations the Southern Pacific Co. could not continue to operate the Breakwater after the rail line is completed on account of parallel lines and, it is hoped during the interim to give equally satisfactory service as with the Breakwater.

The date effective of the new arrangement will be announced within a few days; it being necessary to publish tariffs and file same with the State Railroad Commission, which ordinarily requires ten days notice to the public and filing with the Commission. Efforts are being made however, to secure permission from the Commission to make the tariffs effective on less than the full statutory notice.

Has Lost Money

It is explained that the reason for taking the Breakwater out of service at this time is that the repairs required would cost in the neighborhood of \$2500.00 and, this in view of a loss of approximately \$21,000.00 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, and a loss of \$2,000.00 per month since that time with prospect for a still greater deficit, continued operations of the boat is unwise.

This explanation is made that the public may understand the causes leading up to the action taken.

Will Start Soon

Agent Stuhr, of the North Pacific Steamship Company, received a telegram this morning from C. P. Doe, the manager, stating that the new rate would go into effect with the next sailing of the Santa Clara from Portland, which will be about next Monday.

HAS STRONG TEAM BOAT WATERLOGGED

MARSHFIELD ELEVEN HAVE WALK AWAY IN NORTH BEND
Final Score of 33 to 0 Indicates Coach Niles Has Strong Aggregation—More Practice

From the time Referee Ben Fisher blew his whistle yesterday to the end of the last quarter the Marshfield high school football team played practically in the enemies territory at North Bend yesterday afternoon. Final score: Marshfield 33, North Bend, 0.

It was Coach Niles' first tryout of his men. He said that he is satisfied with the way they worked. Lyons at center was passing steady. Seaman at full was working well, though he was a trifle slow at safety and fumbled a few punts. Burrows out on end several times got away for good gains, once in the fourth taking a forward pass and squirmed through North Bend's lines of defense almost to the goal posts.

The scoring was well scattered through the quarters, but at no time did North Bend endanger the local eleven's goal.
