**YOUNG BOY IN W. A. KELLEY FAMILY SICK**

**Bay Park Family Quarantined—No Other Cases Have Been Reported There**

Another case of diphtheria has been reported in the W. A. Kelley family of Bay Park, the family having moved there from Bunker Hill a few days ago. One of the 11 year old twin boys was taken sick on Sunday and a quarantine was immediately placed on the residence. It is said that there are no other cases of diphtheria now in Bay Park or Bunker Hill.

On Thursday Dr. Cullin, county health officer, came over and lifted the quarantine on the Kelley family. Director Orr, of the school board in Bunker Hill, asked that the children be kept from school for a few days to await developments. The boy came down with diphtheria on Sunday. The other children in the family have been vaccinated.

# COW IS DANGEROUS

**KICKS AND BREAKS LEG OF WILLIAM WEIR, AGED RANCHER**

**Was Attempting to Drive Animal out of Stall—Is 79 Years of Age and Accident May Go Hard**

Attempting to chase a cow out of the wrong stall last evening William Weir, a prominent and aged rancher of Willanch Inlet, received a broken leg when the animal kicked him. He was brought to North Bend where Drs. Ira Bartle and Horsfall worked on him. The fact that Mr. Weir is about 79 years of age is expected to make his recovery very difficult. After he came out from under the anaesthetic last night Mr. Weir told how the accident happened. Though an old man he is still active about his big ranch and takes a lively interest in all the affairs.

Bossie got in the wrong stall in the barn and became mad when Mr. Weir went in to drive her out. She jammed him against the wall and kicked at him, breaking his leg. Mrs. Weir came hurrying to his aid and got him into the house and later he was removed by a special boat to North Bend.

Today Mr. Weir is resting easy at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. J. Davis, in North Bend where he will remain until able to be about again.
