**RESIGNS AGENCY GAGE VISITS HERE**

W. F. STUHR, OF NORTH PACIFIC COMPANY, TO GO  
Will be Transferred Back to San Francisco, Says E. B. Fryer—McGeorge Petitions for Position

W. F. Stuhr, agent of the North Pacific Steamship Company on Coos Bay, has tendered his resignation in this capacity and very likely will be transferred in a short time back to the San Francisco office of the company, according to word received here today. No agent has been appointed in his place, states E. B. Fryer, traveling freight and passenger agent of the company.

**Opened Separate Office**  
It was in May that the North Pacific Company put on its present five-day service between San Francisco, Eureka, Coos Bay and Portland. The George W. Elder was taken off and the steamships Kilburn and Santa Clara put on. Inasmuch as Mr. McGeorge was then agent for the North Smith, in the San Francisco trade, it was impossible for him to hold both berths and a new agent was sent here.

**Came From California**  
Mr. Stuhr has been connected with the North Pacific Steamship Company for some time and has made many friends since his coming here. He formerly was chief clerk to the head of the Alaskan Steamship Company with headquarters in San Francisco.

**Recommends McGeorge**  
E. B. Fryer, of the North Pacific Company, this morning sent to President Dow the following telegram: "With the appointment of C. F. McGeorge we guarantee you our support. Signed by 74 merchants, 12 manufacturers, five tenants, 11 jobbers, five resident salesmen, six transfer companies. Total 113 signers. This constitutes practically every shipper in Marshfield. I have examined the list and found the same correct."  
Mr. McGeorge has for many years been in the steamboat business as agent for vessels, having taken the present dock at a time when the proceeds wouldn't pay the office rent.

Although Mr. Gage has made no announcement of his plans, it is understood that he will be a candidate for the democratic nomination for sheriff at the democratic primaries again next spring. He has not forgotten his old campaigning tactics and was kept busy shaking hands and greeting old acquaintances today.

**Liljeqvist Will Run**  
L. A. Liljeqvist, who has made such an able district attorney, will be a candidate for the republican nomination at the May primaries. He has not officially announced his candidacy but will soon. His friends say that he will have a walkaway in the primaries and election.

**All Judges Run**  
The announcement that Judge Cole will be a candidate for re-nomination on the republican ticket for circuit judge makes it certain that all three incumbents will be up again. Judge Hamilton and Skipworth are democrats and will seek the nomination of their party.



**HUNTERS, HERE'S SOME VALUABLE INFORMATION THAT WILL HELP YOU**

**Official Sunrise and Sunset Time Given for the Entire Duck-Hunting Season—May Save You From Arrest Some Foggy Morning or Cloudy Afternoon**

IF YOU shoot game before or after the hours prescribed by the Federal law in the State of Oregon, you are subject to arrest. Sometimes on foggy mornings it is only possible to know of sunrise and sunset by the hours. For the information and convenience of hunters The Times prints the following official time of sunrise and sunset for this section, for the entire duck-hunting season, the open season for ducks and geese being from October 1 to January 15 and the bag limit 30 in any seven consecutive days.

Have a roadway stop and waste cock at some convenient point so that you can shut off the entire water supply at any time.
