EUROPEAN WAR ONE YEAR AGO TODAY

OCT. 17, 1914 The British cruiser Undaunted sank four German torpedo boat destroyers off the Dutch coast. The German troops reach the North Sea in the vicinity of Ostend and fighting continues in the neighborhood of Dunkerque.

OCT. 18, 1914 The Germans are checked in their attempt to reach Dunkerque. German newspapers state that war against England will begin this month with Belgium as the base of operations.

The Austrians claim to have made progress on the San and Danube rivers and the Russians claim to have captured 1,000 Austrian prisoners and repulsed an attempt to cross the San.

Anti-German mobs in London wreck German stores and bakeries. The new submarine E-3 is sunk in the North Sea by German warships.

VIEW FINE HIGHWAY

EDGAR McDANIEL TELLS OF ROAD WORK INSPECTED

Was With Coos County Delegation Sent to Look Into Multnomah County Road Building

Edgar McDaniel, publisher of the Coos Bay Harbor of North Bend, has returned from Portland, where he went to attend the grand lodge meeting of the Knights of Pythias. He came back overland yesterday. While in Portland Mr. McDaniel joined the party of Coos County men who made the trip there to inspect the road building, and was with the Coos delegates for one day when they made an auto tour over 45 miles of the Columbia Highway which is being built by the Warren Construction Company. The party was composed of County Judge Watson, Commissioner Armstrong, W. A. Reid and Charles Hall, of Marshfield; A. G. Raab of North Bend; Thomas Neilson, of Bandon; Edgar McDaniel and W. F. Arnold, of the Warren Company, who acted as escort for the party. The Coos County men were guests of the company on the trip.

Wonderful Work

Mr. McDaniel says the highway is a wonderful piece of work and that the trip is a beautiful one. They left Portland at 8 o'clock in the morning and returned at 6 o'clock at night and had ample time to make a close inspection of the work. The contract for the 45 miles of the highway was awarded to the Warren Company and started in July and is now almost completed. There was yet enough of the actual work under construction for the committee to make a detailed inspection of how the road was being built.

Contract Big One

Mr. McDaniel says the road is 18 feet wide. It has a foundation of 6 inches of crushed rock, which is rolled down to 4 inches, and on top of this is two inches of bitulithic. Some idea of the magnitude of the job may be gathered from the fact that there are 18 plants working, all larger than the one on Coos Bay, and 32 ten-ton steam rollers busy on the job. It is said to be the largest contract for hard surface road ever let in the United States at one time. Other portions of the highway are being built by other contractors. Mr. McDaniel says that the Coos County men were greatly impressed with the beauty of the highway and with the hard surface roadway.

On a Committee

During the session of the grand lodge of the K. of P. Mr. McDaniel was elected grand inner guard. More important than this office, however, he was named as one of a committee of fifteen, the members who are to arrange for the entertainment of the Supreme Lodge at Portland. This is to be a big gathering of men from all over the United States and at the same time the grand lodge will hold a meeting. The grand lodge members are not privileged to attend the Supreme Lodge sessions, but there will be open meetings when all can be present.

Plenty of Money

The committee has \$7500 to spend in the entertainment of the Supreme Lodge at Portland and several meetings to arrange details will be held. Of the \$7500 the sum of \$5000 is contributed by the grand lodge of the state and \$2500 was given by the Portland business men.
