D. W. SMALL LEAVES NEED NEW SCHOOL

PIONEER RAILROAD BUILDER TO SPEND WINTER IN IDAHO

Was One of First Steamboatmen on Snake River—Returns to Scenes of Early Operations

D. W. Small who left today on the Kilburn for Lewiston, Idaho, to spend the winter with his two brothers, prominent farmers there, has been for years a resident of the Northwest and one of the pioneer railroad builders on the Northern Pacific line from the east. He is now an old man close to 80 years of age and for the past 12 years has been a resident of Marshfield, residing with his son, S. C. Small.

Born in Maine Mr. Small was naturally under the northern colors when he entered the cavalry in the Civil War. There he spent four years before coming west.

Early Steamboat Man With his brothers he entered the steamboat business on the Snake river with headquarters in Lewiston. This was one of the first lines operated in that section. There were no railroads at that time near Lewiston.

For several years Mr. Small was a contractor, aiding to build the Northern Pacific line into the Northwest, especially across the state of Idaho. At the same time O. E. Torrey, also of this city, was a contractor on the same road, though he says he did not meet Mr. Small until several years later, though both had heard of the other.

Mr. Small, always a leader, along in the 80's was Mayor of Walla Walla, at the time the fort was located there and that was the general distribution point to the mines throughout that country.

Built First Railroad Freighters needed a railroad down to the Snake river and D. Blalock, who died a few years ago, and members of the Baker family, prominent in Walla Walla, undertook the construction of a line to Wallawa and Mr. Small became interested in the building of it. The line consisted of logs and heavy timbers covered with iron scrap in lieu of rails. A funny, little old engine used to puff up and down this line, taking the wheat down to the steamboats on the Snake for transportation down to Portland. This line was subsequently sold for several hundred thousand dollars.

The first log drive down the Yakima River was made by Mr. Small and at the time of the gold rush to Alaska, he went there with his son, S. C. Small, and they were for some two years engaged in packing over the famous White Horse trail between Dye and Lake Bennett. And it was in 1903 that Mr. Small, still active, came here and made some of the first grades in Plat B for Major Kinney.

WEDDING ANNIVERSARY POSTPONES FLAGSTAFF MEETING

E. L. McClure Finds at 11th Hour That School Gathering Comes On Third Anniversary

Such a thing as a school meeting certainly ought not to interfere with a wedding anniversary. E. L. McClure argued thusly last evening when, at the eleventh hour he found that the gathering at Flagstaff to discuss a new school there was on the date of the third anniversary of Mr. McClure's wedding, and the meeting was hastily postponed until Monday evening.

Raymond E. Baker, county school superintendent, came over to be present. He laughed when he heard the reason for the change, attended to other business here and will be back again Monday. Today he made a trip out to the Eastport school.

School Crowded The Flagstaff school is crowded said Mr. McClure this morning. He believes the district should be bonded for at least \$4,000. Of this \$500 would be needed to buy additional ground and the remainder for a modern building.

The present grounds are about 85 feet by 210 feet, approximately an acre of ground, though when the county road in front of the school was changed the grounds lost a 20 foot strip along the road.

Need Another Teacher The fact that probably another teacher would be needed was carried in The Times on Wednesday evening and Thursday Mr. McClure got a wire from a teacher in Medford applying for the position. Miss Eva Dresser is now in charge of the school.

RUMOR EXTENSION

TALK OF RAILROAD GOING ON DOWN COAST

Report That Line May Be Started from Coos Bay Through Curry County

There is again heard the rumor that the railroad is to be extended on down the coast through Curry county to connect at Eureka. This time it comes from a Curry county man who talked with engineers who have been at work north of here and whom he quotes as saying that they expect to soon be put to work on the extension of the railroad south of Coos Bay.

According to the story it seemed to be the impression of these railroad men that the extension would be started as soon as the road into Coos Bay was completed. Officials of the company who have been here during the past few months have denied any definite knowledge of building on down the coast, though some have admitted that such extension in time would be made.

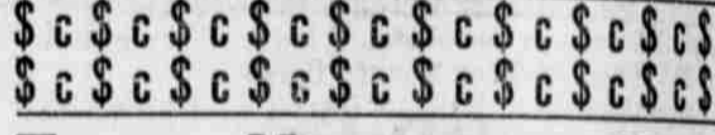
