"UNITED STATES FIRST," IMMIGRANTS ARE TOLD

Striking Lithographic Poster in Marshfield Postoffice Advises Foreigners to Study

"America First" is the title of a striking lithographic poster just issued by the Federal Bureau of Education, urging foreign born residents to fit themselves for citizenship. A copy has been posted in the Marshfield post office where it has attracted much attention. It is one of the very few advertisements ever published by the government and probably the only pictorial appeal ever issued outside of those advertising army and navy recruiting or the parcel post.

"Learn English; attend night school; become a citizen," it says. "It means a better opportunity and a better home in America. It means a better job. It means a better chance for your children. It means a better America. Ask the nearest public school about classes. If there is none in your town write to the United States bureau of education. The words are printed in Italian, Polish, Yiddish, Lithuanian, Bohemian and Hungarian. The bureau has found that there are in the United States 3,000,000 foreign-born folk ten years of age and over, who are unable to read or speak English, and that more than one-half are unable to read or write any language.
