**Go After Deer**—Jay Doyle and Midge Welch left yesterday for Powers where they are taking a week at the deer sale to be roamed through the main streets and immediate environs of the metropolis. Both intend to return with venison, maybe this evening.

**Also Has Corn**—Charles Mahaffey is the latest farmer to be added to the list of those wishing to exhibit corn at the show to be held here about November 18. The list is growing daily and it is expected there will be at least two dozen entries before the closing date.

**Eastside Council Meets**—There is a meeting of the Eastside Council this evening at Eastside. It is expected that several matters of importance will be discussed and probably the board of the election appointed. The Eastside Council meets the fourth Tuesday in every month.

**Dr. Abbott to Speak**—Dr. J. T. Abbott, of Eugene, arrived today in the interests of the Methodist church. He spends today here looking after the work in this district and tomorrow evening is slated for an address in the Bay Park Chapel. Dr. Abbott makes about four trips a year into Coos county.

**Ask Us to Come**—George E. Hardy, new executive secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, has written that October 30 is Oregon Day at the Panama Pacific Exposition, and every one that can be requested to be there on that date. There will be ceremonies, plenty of them, and Governor Withycombe, of Oregon, will hobnob with Governor Johnson of California.

**Take Up Law Practice**—Former state University students will be interested to know that in the list of successful aspirants for admission to the bar in Oregon this fall are the names of Arthur Geary, Russel D. Calkins and Wendel C. Barbour. All graduated from Oregon and later studied law in the east, Geary at Columbia University, Calkins at Michigan and Barbour at Harvard.

**Ask Representative**—It is possible that when the National Chamber of Commerce holds its annual meeting in Washington, February 8, 9 and 10, that Marshfield will be represented. It may be possible that on those dates the Port of Coos Bay will have a delegation before Congress seeking aid in securing a jetty appropriation. Last year Chief Clerk of the Senate Henry H. Gilroy, an Oregonian, represented this city.

**Not to Reduce Rates**—In a letter received recently from the Assistant Postmaster General of the United States came the information that no reduction can now be made in the postal rates to Australasian points. This was advocated by the Chamber some time ago and also by the body in Portland. The five cents an ounce still obtains with three cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. The present rate was adopted at the Universal Postal Convention in Rome.

**Seek Expert Trade Man**—The U. S. Civil Service Commission has issued the announcement that on November 30 will be held an examination to secure a special agent to be known as a Latin-American trade expert whose business it will be to travel through the United States, meet with shippers and manufacturers and stimulate trade with South America. He will receive \$3,000 and expenses. He must speak Spanish, and must also have spent three years in the Latin trade. Particulars regarding this examination have been received at the Chamber of Commerce.

**Deer Season Ending**—The 1915 deer season is rapidly drawing to a close and Sunday is the latest date on which the man with a juicy appetite for deer meat can take his trusty rifle into the hills.
