IS TRIED IN COUNTY COURT AT COQUILLE TODAY

He Was Arrested in Marshfield After Appearing With Knife and Threatening to Kill

(Special to The Times.) COQUILLE, Ore., Oct. 29.—Jan. Dunn was today tried in the County Court for his sanity and was found to be insane and was committed to the State Hospital for the Insane at Salem.

Dunn is the man who created an excitement in Marshfield several days ago when he appeared in the Bunker Hill addition with a knife and announced that he intended killing someone.

Sheriff Johnson has notified the asylum officials to come for the man.

MANY ARE PRESENT

PAULIST MISSIONARY HEARD BY LARGE AUDIENCE

Will Speak Again Tonight On Different Subject at the Orpheum—All Invited

A large audience attended the Catholic mission last night. It is stated the old saying that one half of the world does not know how the other half lives, is being brought home to the people of Marshfield each night at the Orpheum, as Father Cartwright answers questions, and lectures on Catholic doctrine.

Whatever of prejudice may be in the non Catholic mind concerning the Catholic church the missionary says, he is convinced is founded on ignorance of her doctrine and misunderstanding of her motives. From this as a starting point he ever keeps in mind his purpose to teach, teach, teach.

Last evening after giving three-quarters of an hour to the answering of questions, he gave a magnificent exposition of the Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence in the Eucharist. Nothing could be clearer than his development of the 6th Chapter of St. John's Gospel, wherein Christ spoke of the necessity of union with Him in the sacrament of His love. "Except you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink His blood you shall not have life in you," reads the passage.

Quotes The Bible

From this, which he called the foreshadowing, or the promise of Christ, the speaker next took up the fulfillment of this promise as found in the account of the last supper as given in Matthew, Mark and Luke, arguing clearly and strongly for the literal interpretation of the words: "This is my body, this is my blood." Then to the teaching of St. Paul as found in 1st Cor. X and XI Chap.

"A figurative or symbolic interpretation robs these words of their meaning, and creates the many contradictory and therefore erroneous opinions of our separated brethren. Whereas a literal interpretation maintains absolute harmony between the synoptic's account of the last supper and St. Paul's," the speaker said.

Explains Presence

Then from a beautiful incident in a persons conversion to the faith, he sought to bring home to him audience the truths of the Catholic teaching that our Lord is really and truly present, body, blood, soul and divinity in the Eucharist.

Tonights lecture will take up the Catholic practice of prayer to the Saints and its devotion to the Virgin Mother of Christ.

HAS "BULLY" PLAN

SALESMAN STRIKES KEYNOTE OF COOS BAY NEEDS

Exhibits Simple Egg Carrier Made of Spruce That Brings \$600,000 Annually to Small Town

An egg carrier, made of spruce and claimed to be cheaper than paper, was exhibited in the city by a salesman from Portland today, who emphasized the fact that such articles as these can be manufactured at good market prices always while the usual lumber market is at a low ebb.

"Shows what can be done with some of your native woods," he said. "This thing," and he pulled out the carrier, "does not have to depend entirely on the lumber market. It has a value entirely apart and is taking its place as a commercial necessity."

He showed that the carriers are manufactured in a little Washington town and that some \$600,000 of them are sold annually in the United States.

"Coos Bay has the lumber, has the facilities, why doesn't she get a few industries like these?" the salesman asked. "Believe me, it brings good money into a community and can make a steady pay roll. You don't necessarily have to manufacture this particular article—this is just a sample of what you can do."

The carrier in question is made from thin spruce and is as light as paper and held together in several simple sections. The salesman said that sort would open a fairly profitable industry here.

The fact that side industries from the lumber are needed here has been recognized, but very little done so far. An effort was made to get a war contract here for the manufacture of portable houses. The last word appeared favorable, and it is possible that some of these houses may be made here. This, however, is expected to be but a temporary industry.

The Chamber of Commerce has several times discussed the matter, but nothing yet has been done. Other sections are doing it, declares the man who travels through the Northwest and who sees what is being done elsewhere and his question was: "Why in the Sam Hill can't Coos Bay do something like this too?"
