ASKS AID OF U. S.

JAPAN WANTS AMERICA TO AID IN STOPPING CHINESE MOVE

Thought Change to Monarchy Should Not be Attempted Until War Has Been Settled

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

TOKYO, Oct. 30.—The Japanese government has requested the American government to give its support in representations which are being made at Peking for the purpose of postponing the re-establishment of a monarchy in China until the European war is ended. Japan's policy was decided upon after a consultation with Great Britain.

REQUEST SENT OUT

Japanese Asked Aid of U. S. and Entente Powers

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) PEKING, Oct. 30.—The Japanese government Oct. 16 communicated to the entente powers and the United States a request that they act with it in attempting to bring about a postponement of the change of the form of the Chinese government. The United States and France abstained in steps taken at Peking by Japan, Great Britain and Russia.

This phase of the situation is causing much speculation among Chinese officials, some of whom express the belief that France and the United States are not willing to follow the Japanese leadership in Oriental politics.

SEATTLE TO LEAVE

The dredge Seattle of the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging Company is being prepared for sea and it is said on the waterfront that the craft will get away on Wednesday for the north after a stay here of two years during which time she was employed in digging Coos Bay to a depth of 25 feet from the bar to the Smith Mill.

It is probable that the tug Goliath, the largest tow boat on the Pacific, will come from Seattle to take her north and that a steam schooner will be engaged to take the remainder of the paraphernalia.

Of the old crew it is said that Captain Thorsheim, Axel Bonnel-ykke, Frank Arnot and Joe May will go north on her. The understanding is that the Seattle will go to work on Puget Sound.

Disaster Is Observed from Coast Guard Station and Savers Standing By

STAGE IS DELAYED

High seas breaking up to the very sea wall upset the beach traffic of yesterday between Coos Bay and Florence. Stages leaving Marshfield at 6 o'clock yesterday morning failed to get clear through to the Umpqua and returned here about 11:30 last night. Passengers from Florence were delayed over night at Gardiner and on the road down one of their cars was swept completely over by the waves. It was empty at the time. The stages came through all right today.

Swept by Water The storm of yesterday was general along the southern Oregon coast. At 6 a. m. the stages left Florence for Coos Bay. Delays put them back several hours and at noon the Umpqua was reached. It was on this trip the cars were swept by the water. Last evening the party came down to the mouth of the Umpqua expecting to find the stages waiting. They were met by one driver, whose machine was stuck in the sand a mile down the beach, and so went back to Gardiner.

In the meantime other stages from Coos Bay reached the Umpqua, pulled out, the machine but found the passengers gone and so came back.

Experts Think Hesperian Was Torpedoed

State Fragment of Engine of War Found Could Not Have Been Piece of Mine

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—Secretary Lansing announced today that the Navy Department had definitely established the fact that the fragment of an engine of war, which sank the steamer Hesperian, showed that it had been torpedoed. In the opinion of the United States naval experts, the fragment could not have been a part of a marine mine. Will Inform Germany Secretary Lansing said the result of the navy department investigation would be communicated immediately to the German government.

FORM BIG COMPANY

INCORPORATE STEAMSHIP COMPANIES

Capital Is Three Million and Prominent Chinese Hold Some of the Stock

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Interest and curiosity was aroused in shipping circles here by the incorporation at Albany of the Pacific and Eastern Steamship Company. It is capitalized for \$2,000,000 and some of the shares are owned by prominent Chinese, one of them Kai Fu Sha, who is about to retire as Chinese Minister at Washington. Officers refused to discuss the purposes of the company, except to say that it is a big enterprise.

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS IMPOSED FOR VIOLATING NEUTRALITY

Dr. Addis and Ralph K. Blair are Fined—No Prison Sentence Is Given

EXPECT BATTLE TO START SOON

Villa Forces Gathering to Meet Carranza Army at Agua Prieta Over Border

ONE ATTACK TODAY

Carranza Patrol Fights With Three Hundred Villa Men and Drives Them Back

ARMY IS IN BAD SHAPE

Reported That Villa Men Are Hardly Able to Fight and That Women and Children Camp Followers Are in Pitiable Condition

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—Skirmishing between the Villa and Carranza forces near Agua Prieta are reported today by General Funston. Three hundred Villa troops were attacked at Cabrillon by the Carranza patrol and forced to retreat to Anavae, west of Agua Prieta. The main Villa army camped last night on the banks of the San Bernardino River. General Funston reported the Villa attack probably will come from the East.

OFFICIALS SATISFIED

The position of the main Villa force is satisfactory to the officials of the War Department, for the reason that, barring accident, the entire Carranza force now being transported through American territory will have crossed the border to Agua Prieta before night.

IN PITIABLE SHAPE

Women and Children With Villa Forces are Suffering

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) DOUGLAS, Ariz., Oct. 30.—Villa's army resumed at daylight the march on Agua Prieta, across the border from here, preceded by a cavalry advance guard which reached a point 18 miles east of here.

Carranza scouts reported that Villa's troops are hardly able to fight and that the women and children composed the customary camp followers, are in a pitiable state. Five hundred Villa cavalrymen reached Slaughter's ranch on the border 18 miles east of here today. On that part of the ranch on the American side, United States cavalry and a machine gun platoon were placed on guard.

RUSSIA SENDS MEN

LARGE BODIES OF TROOPS ARE LEAVING FOR BULGARIA

Transports From Odessa and Sebastopol are Heavily Convoyed, Berlin Paper Says

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 30.—Large contingents of Russian troops have set sail from Black Sea ports of Odessa and Sebastopol for the Bulgarian coast, the Berlin Tageblatt says.

The dispatch, telegraphed to the Tageblatt from Bucharest, says the transports were convoyed by a strong squadron. Recent attacks on the Bulgarian port of Varna by the Russian warships, according to this account, was made in preparation for an attempt to land troops.

CABINET IS NAMED

W. A. Reid, who has been talked of, is said to be most acceptable to Straw's supporters. Dr. Straw personally went to Mr. Reid some days ago and told him that he would support either Carl Evertsen or Mr. Reid.

SERBIAN TOWN IS OCCUPIED

Fall of Pirot Severe Blow As It Leaves the Road Open to Nish

FIGHT SEVERE ONE

Seige of Stronghold Last Two Days Before the Position is Finally Captured

SITUATION IS CRITICAL

Serbs are Returning North With Idea of Joining the Main Army in the Interior Where State of Siege is Rapidly Approaching

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SOFIA, Oct. 30.—The fall of Pirot Wednesday morning was a severe blow to the Serbian army, since the reduction of this strong fort leaves open the road to Nish. The capture followed three days of desperate fighting.

The Serbian position is now extremely critical. Serbians near Mitrovitza and Prishtina are returning north with the evident purpose of joining the main army in the interior, where it is said a state of siege is rapidly approaching.

PLIGHT DESPERATE

ENGLAND ADMITS THAT SERBIA IS IN BAD WAY

Capital Has Been Moved From Nish to Some Unknown Point—Army in Danger

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Continued progress of the Teutonic and Bulgarian forces invading Serbia was reported today by Berlin. The Austro-Germans captured thousands of prisoners and three cannon. London says the position of Serbia is becoming more desperate daily.

Nish is threatened by the Bulgarians while the Teutons gradually are opening a way toward the great Serbian arsenal at Krageyevitza.

Capital Is Moved Rome reports that the Serbian capital was removed to a "certain point." Sofia reports Serbians in retreat in a westerly direction all along the Bulgarian front.

Unofficial dispatches say the Bulgarian officer commanding the advance patrol dined with the Austro-German staff.

Paris says the British troops at Salonki have been ordered to depart for the Serbian front, where junction with the Serbians is already effected.

FIGHT IN WEST

In the west, Paris reports progress at Bois En Hache and a repulse of the German attack on Riga and Dyvinsk.
