Carl Evertsen stated positively today that he would not be a candidate for mayor under any circumstances. However, he said that he had decided after considering the requests of friends to be a candidate for reelection to the council.

So far, no other candidates have been brought forth for the various places to be filled. The primary election will be held next Monday, November 8.
