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EUROPEAN WAR ONE YEAR AGO TODAY

NOV. 9, 1914

The Allies claim to have repulsed all attacks of the Germans. Ypres is in flames. Advance patrols of the Belgians have penetrated to Ostend.

The Germans repulse the Russians on the East Prussian frontier, capturing 4,000 prisoners. The Germans withdraw beyond the Vistula and the Austrians are driven back toward Cracow.

General DeWet, rebel leader in South Africa, defeats the British troops.

MEDFORD—The Jackson County Business Men's Association has decided to get behind the county fair and help make it a success.

EUGENE—Six foreigners were admitted to citizenship in the circuit court of Lane county.

ROSEBURG—The expenditures of conducting the circuit court of Douglas for the past twelve months have been so much greater than expected that the funds have been exhausted.

EUGENE—Richard Arrison, of the Salem football team, was badly burned by an explosion of a composition prepared to make a noise and smoke for a demonstration at a football game.

LEBANON—A. W. Markee, a homesteader, brought to the city the skins of two cougars he killed when both attacked him at the same time.

PORTLAND—Thomas Smith, aged 24 years, was arrested because he tried to chop off the head of an infant child.

INDEPENDENCE—The annual school budget just issued shows that \$8865 is required for teachers' salaries and nearly as much more to conduct the city schools.

DALLAS—W. Wynn Johnson, former newspaper man, who has been engaged in fruit raising, will return to his old business, and has taken a place as advertising manager for a Los Angeles daily paper.

AMITY—The new business block of Crook & Rea has been finished and part of it is occupied by the post office.

ROSEBURG—At the request of the district attorney the present grand jury will be held over until the February term of court.

EUGENE—Fruit growers of this locality will can sauer-kraut and will supply 6000 cases for the market.
