Has New Boat.—Captain Britt, of the Coast Guard Station, came up this morning from the lower bay in his new power boat Ripple which

he has just completed. The boat has a high-power engine and is built on a semi-speed model with a hull designed by a naval boat builder. He has been working on the craft for several weeks, and will use it in work about the bay. When tuned up it may have a speed of 17 or 18 miles an hour.

To Wire Aid.—As secretary of the Coos Good Roads Association Earl Powell has addressed a letter to the commercial bodies of the county and the county court asking them to send wires this week to the State Highway Commission meeting in Salem to make out the annual budget for Oregon roads, asking that it be taken into consideration that this county is sadly in need of highways and extensive repairs to the present roads.

Simpson for Legislature.—J. S. Barton who was here from Coquille last night on business urged that L. J. Simpson be a candidate for the State Legislature at the next election, using it as a stepping stone to Congress. Mr. Barton said that as W. C. Hawley would be a candidate for reelection to Congress, he thought that talk of Simpson for the place now was ill-advised.

Flag is Found.—The large American flag, made of silk and attached to a beautiful standard mounted with an eagle and sent here to be presented to the circuit court to be used during the granting of citizenship papers has been found aboard the wrecked Santa Clara and is said to be in the possession of several young men of the city. Inasmuch as the flag is a gift and coming here for patriotic purposes R. O. Graves is making an appeal to have the flag restored. It is slightly damaged by salt water.

Ford is Stolen.—The police here have received word from Sheriff T. M. Hurlbert, of Multnomah County, advising them to be on the lookout for a 1914 model Ford car stolen from First and Stark streets in Portland on October 25. The license number of the machine is No. 1933. There is a \$25 reward for the recovery of the car.

Newspapers Come Early.—By a new change at the Postoffice newspapers now arrive in the morning on the 9:38 train from Coquille along with the letter mail, instead of waiting until the 5 o'clock train. The mail comes into Myrtle Point from Roseburg in time to catch the star route mail boat leaving there the next morning for Coquille, where the train is met. This means the delivery of papers here at least nine hours earlier than heretofore.
